The Washington County Board of Education (WCBOE) opposes House Bill 981.

Local boards of education in Maryland, and across the country, are required to accommodate service animals under the Americans With Disabilities Act (ADA). A service animal is defined under the ADA as one that has been individually trained to do work or perform tasks for an individual with a disability.

A therapy dog as defined by House Bill 981 provides "affection and comfort" to a student. The ADA does not recognize a dog as a service animal if the dog's mere presence provides <u>comfort</u>. However, if the dog is trained to sense an anxiety attack and take specific action to help avoid the attack or lessen its impact, the dog would qualify as a service animal.

Therapy dogs are not considered service animals under the ADA and as such, should not be permitted in a school setting. Only service animals, which do work or perform tasks, should be permitted in a school. Providing "affection and comfort" is simply not enough to allow the use of a therapy dog in a school setting.

WCBOE urges the committee to issue an unfavorable report on House Bill 981.
