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HB 364 State Finance and Procurement - Central Collection Unit - Powers

Honorable Chair McIntosh and Esteemed Members of the Committee,

I am happy to introduce to you HB 364 State Finance and Procurement – Central Collection Unit – Powers. This bill simply reduces the State's Central Collection Unit's (CCU) collection fee from a high 17% to a more modest 5% fee. This will address the high costs levied on struggling individuals and working families that owe debt (other than overdue taxes) to the State.

Families across our state are struggling as these costs continue to rise. Individuals fall behind on their financial obligations and owe a debt to the state. These debts take many forms: including video tolls, tuition and fees at State schools, fines for lapsed auto insurance, and more. As the costs of housing, healthcare, college, and consumer debt increase, while wages remain stagnant, poverty is increasing. A recent Federal Reserve report found that 40% of Americans don't have \$400 in savings to cover an unexpected expense. In 2018, the United Way's ALICE (Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed) report found that the number of Maryland households that cannot meet their basic needs increased 22% between 2010-2016¹. Since last year's bill and with the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, there has been growing consensus among that this bill is necessary and the Attorney General's office has included this issue in their COVID-19 Access to Justice Task Force Report. There is an amendment to the bill that would remove the bracketed section on page one, line 19-20: [or (ii) without suit, settle the debt or claim;].

These individuals should repay the state for the debt that they owe. At the same time, we, as policymakers, should do what we can to ensure the debt is repaid in a way that doesn't push these families into deeper poverty, or make it more difficult for them to maintain their current financial obligations while repaying the debt they owe the state.
