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### SB 287 - Income Tax - Subtraction Modification for Centenarians Support Senate Budget and Taxation Committee January 26<sup>th</sup>, 2021

Good afternoon Chairman Guzzone and members of the Senate Budget and Taxation Committee. My name is Tammy Bresnahan. I am the Director of Advocacy for AARP MD. AARP Maryland is one of the largest membership-based organizations in the State. AARP MD and its 850,000 members support **SB 287 - Income Tax - Subtraction Modification for Centenarians.** We thank Senator Hayes for introducing this bill.

As you may know, AARP is the largest nonprofit, nonpartisan organization representing the interests of Americans age 50 and older and their families. Key priorities of our organization include helping all Marylanders achieve financial and health security. In particular, AARP strongly believes that all individuals have the right to be self-reliant and live with dignity in retirement.

In short, this bill creates a subtraction modification against the State income tax for an individual who is at least 100 years of age. The maximum value of the subtraction modification is equal to \$50,000 of the income received by an individual during a taxable year if the individual is at least 100 years old on the last day of the taxable year. The bill takes effect July 1, 2021, and applies to taxable years beginning after December 31, 2020.

To live to be 100 is a phenomenal achievement for anyone. Reaching 100 years of age signifies a fantastic life goal for both men and women. The CDC reports roughly 70,000 people living in the United States are centenarians, meaning about 0.2% of people make it to 100 in America. Allowing a subtraction modification to Marylanders who live to 100 and beyond is the right thing to do.

The Maryland Catholic Conference ("Conference") represents the public policy interests of the three Roman Catholic (arch) dioceses serving Maryland: the Archdiocese of Baltimore, the Archdiocese of Washington, and the Diocese of Wilmington.

Senate Bill 287 creates a subtraction modification against the State income tax for an individual who is at least 100 years of age. The maximum value of the subtraction modification is equal to \$50,000 of the income received by an individual.

Chair Pendergrass, Vice Chair Peña-Melnyk, and Members of the Committee, please be advised that the Baltimore City Administration (BCA) **supports** House Bill (HB) 28.

HB 28 requires, among other provisions, the Office of Minority Health and Health Disparities to publish, to a certain extent, health data that includes race and ethnicity information collected by the Office and to provide updates at least every 6 months and develop a cultural competency program regarding implicit bias for health occupations.

In Baltimore City, extreme disparities exist between majority and minority residents. To address these disparities, greater data must be made available to local governments, as well as Maryland residents, to better focus assistance. Additionally, minority residents in the City are disadvantaged when their health providers dismiss their concerns due to a lack of cultural competency or biases of which they are not cognizant. Overall, this bill addresses many of the concerns BCA has with respect to its care for its most vulnerable minority residents.

We respectfully request a **favorable** report on House Bill 28.
