Dear Senator Salling:

We present this letter to express our support of SB 644 as it brings light to the Federal SBA HUBZone program that is neglected at the State level in Maryland. Ligon & Ligon, Inc., is a utility construction firm that is committed to a strong Maryland and a strong Baltimore City. We recently marked our 100th Anniversary and have been based in Baltimore City since our founding in 1920. In 2019, the U.S. Small Business Association certified Ligon & Ligon, Inc. as a HUBZone small business, meaning we are located in in an Historically Underutilized Business Zone and hire a large share of our labor force from local HUBZones located in and around Baltimore City.

We support the espoused goal of HB 644 – to recognize and support Maryland's businesses that operate within distressed communities impacted by low income, high poverty, and high unemployment. The U.S. Senate Committee on Small Business report accompanying the HUBZone authorizing legislation in 1997 stated:

Creating new jobs in economically distressed areas has been the greatest challenge for many of our nation's governors, mayors, and community leaders. The trend is for businesses to locate in areas where there are customers and a skilled workforce. Asking a business to locate in a distressed area often seems counter to its potential to be successful. But without businesses in these communities, we don't create jobs, and without sources of new jobs, we are unlikely to have a successful revitalization effort.

Almost 25 years later, in our neighborhoods in Park Heights we see this challenge remains. While the other socioeconomic programs target assistance to individuals with specific characteristics, the HUBZone program targets assistance to geographic areas with specific characteristics, thus casting a complementary but wider net to meet the objectives of job creation and increased capital investment in distressed communities. At the federal level, with a 3% contracting goal, the HUBZone program cannot touch the thousands of HUBZone zip codes stitched all across the U.S.

map. It needs more local emphasis, specifically at the State level to have an impact on the over 300 HUBZone communities in Maryland. This legislation will incentivize businesses to establish in HUBZone locations, to get certified in the HUBZone program and to remain in HUBZone locations, thereby expanding employment opportunities and economic growth within Maryland communities that have the most need.

We strongly recommend that your bill move forward with favorable consideration from both sides of the aisle.

Dear Chairman Guzzone:

The economic virtues of Senate bill-644 has come to my attention. Please allow me to introduce myself, I am Wayne Frazier, Sr., president of Maryland Washington Minority Companies Association, (MWMCA), a minority and women-owned business, construction and design trade association located in Maryland since 2001. We advocate for the inclusion of said trades in all government and private procurement, because we believe it strengthens our total economy.

Concerning SB-644, we believe that it is time to include US HUBZone certified businesses in Maryland as part of Maryland's procurement sourcing supply goals. We believe, it is extremely just because it serves as an economic vehicle to strengthen impoverished communities around the state where historically underutilized businesses may be located. I say may, because every business in Maryland has its choice of location, and most choose to locate outside of impoverished areas, thus keeping them impoverished. Basically, that's the simple criteria of a US HUBZone certified business. However, one main factor or criteria to become certified by any business located in these areas, is that they must hire 35% of their labor from that zone. To us, that is economic life changing that flows back to the families of that community. To us, it also makes no difference whether the business ownership is non-minority or not, or the concern that some businesses may already have minority or disadvantaged certification, thus overlapping programs. Because none of the existing programs requires one to hire 35% of its employees from designated impoverished communities. To us, that is the suddendeath overtime win that changes the equation. US HUBZone certified businesses

deserve to be part of Maryland's socio-economic engineering inclusion because it will lift impoverish communities.

In closing, it's with our upmost pleasure to favorably support the passage of SB-644. Maryland will become the shining example for the rest of the nation to raise up its impoverished business communities!

State Procurement SB0644 - Preferences - Historically Underutilized Business Zone Businesses

Favorable with Amendments: Request to adhere to size standards as defined by SBA.

Chairman Guzzone, Vice-Chair Rosapepe, and Members of the Budget and Taxation Committee. I write to you on behalf of the HUBZone Contractors National Council (HUBZone Council) to express our organization's support for **SB0644** introduced by Senator Sallings to assess the value of establishing a procurement goal for businesses participating in the SBA HUBZone Program.

The HUBZone Contractors National Council (Council) is a non-profit trade association providing information and support for companies and professionals interested in the Small Business Administration's (SBA) HUBZone Program. We would like to thank the Committee for its commitment to small businesses and advancing small businesses in the federal marketplace.

The HUBZone Council has existed since January 2000 and strives to contribute to the economic development of economically distressed communities by creating jobs, reducing unemployment and by strengthening, improving, and promoting the HUBZone Program – and by helping HUBZone-certified companies maximize their success in earning federal contracts.

When first introduced in 1997, the HUBZone program promised to create opportunities for small businesses in low-income communities by helping entrepreneurs access the Federal marketplace. Unlike any other small business program, the HUBZone program was designed to offer firms a path to securing federal contracts based on geography — not veteran, gender, or race-based qualifications. The philosophy was that the unemployed become employed, spending increases within distressed communities, and the benefits are shared by many. The program's objective was to incentivize businesses to locate their companies in communities that suffer from low median income or high employment to stimulate the economy. Businesses must maintain an office and hire 35% of their employees from economically distressed communities to participate in the program.

According to the Small Business Administration's (SBA) Dynamic Small Business Search (DSBS), there are 369 HUBZone certified businesses in Maryland. These businesses have created numerous meaningful jobs and are making huge impacts within their communities. Presently the HUBZone program is only recognized on the Federal level, but less than 4% of the small businesses in Maryland are competing for federal contracts. If Maryland were to begin



recognizing the HUBZone certification under state procurements, it would increase opportunities for Maryland's small businesses, and incentivize firms to recruit personnel from economically distressed communities.

Dear Chair Guzzone and Committee Members:

The Governor's Office of Small, Minority & Women's Business Affairs (GOSBA) respectfully submits the following concerns for the Committee's consideration with regard to SB644 and its potentially wide sweeping impact on the Maryland small business community as a whole as well as the operational impact on this office.

This legislation has the effect of creating a new socio-economic procurement preference program and charges GOSBA with adopting regulations, reporting performance, and evaluating the program's effectiveness.

GOSBA is concerned that having *four* competing preference programs with goals on any given procurement could deter robust competition/interest in state procurements. As it stands, the Minority Business Enterprise Program has an overall goal of 29%, the Small Business Reserve Program has a goal of 15%, and the Veteran-Owned Small Business Enterprise Program has a goal of 1%. The proposed HUB Zone Business Enterprise Program would add an additional goal of 10%. That's a potential total of 55% in subcontracting or direct contracting goals with specific groups, leaving very little flexibility for prime vendors.

In addition, we are also concerned that existing small businesses may be adversely impacted. Maryland's small business threshold as defined in SFP §14-501 differs significantly from the qualifying small business thresholds at the Federal level. Maryland's revenue and employee qualifying thresholds are significantly lower. As a result, this bill may put Maryland's small businesses in direct competition with much larger companies with greater assets, effectively drowning them out.

Implementation would have significant fiscal impact as well. To effectively manage a new procurement preference program such as the bill calls for, there would be a need for additional full-time personnel. Current procurement preference programs administered by GOSBA have at least two staff persons designated to the policy, advocacy, training, compliance and reporting associated with the program.

Additional financial resources would have to be allocated to the following:

- the cost of building a platform and staff to facilitate business registrations
- developing a process for identifying, vetting, certifying, and auditing qualifying businesses
- outreach to the targeted small business community

GOSBA respectfully requests the committee's consideration of the aforementioned concerns in its review of SB644.
