HB662-Autism Coordinator Revisions - FAVORABLE

Dear Madame Chair and Members of the Finance Committee,

I am writing to request a favorable report on HB662 which makes a few simple changes to the State Coordinator of Autism Strategy and Stakeholder's Advisory Group that was established with the passage of HB847 in 2020.

The Autism Coordinator position has recently been filled and the Stakeholder group met for the first time just last month.

HB662 is necessary due to the movement of this position to the Governor's Coordinating Offices and observation of the initial implementation of the original bill. HB662 is similar, but not identical, to the Departmental Bill (SB169) already heard in the Senate Finance Committee. I respectfully request a favorable report on HB662 RATHER than the competing SB169.

Similarities - HB662 adds the Autism Coordinator to the Interagency Disabilities Board, adds Members of the House and Senate to the stakeholder's advisory group, and moves the responsibility of staffing the stakeholder group to the Governor's Office of Community Initiatives from the Department of Disabilities where it is no longer housed.

Differences - HB662 retains the Coordinator as Chair of the Advisory Group as required by HB847 and requires the Coordinator to be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in order to elevate this position and provide legislative oversight to ensure that the most qualified applicants serve in this position. The amendments I have introduced includes the requirement to consider geographical diversity of the state during the appointments process and a clarifying amendment that the Coordinator can add members to the advisory group as considered necessary. In addition this amendment requires funding of a full-time administrative assistant for this office. Thank you for your consideration of HB662.

Dear Chair Kelley and Members of the Finance Committee:

This informational letter regards the similarities and differences between **House Bill 662** -- **Advisory Stakeholder Group on Autism-Related Needs, Interagency Disabilities Board, and the State Coordinator for Autism Strategy -- Membership, Staffing, and Appointment** (HB 662) and **SB 169** -- **State Autism Strategy -- Revisions**, the departmental legislation that was passed out of the Finance Committee and Senate unanimously and is now scheduled for a hearing in Appropriations on April 4, 2022.

Like SB 169, HB 662 would add to the Advisory Group's membership representation from the General Assembly.

Other aspects of HB 662 are distinctly different from SB 169 in the following areas:

 HB 662 was amended in the House and would now require an annual appropriation to GOCI for one support position for the State Coordinator.

- HB 662 would not amend the existing statute by transferring Sections 7–111 and 7–112
 of the Human Services Article, to Sections 9.5 –102 and 9.5–103 of the State
 Government Article, as would SB 169. By not transferring these sections, HB 662 would
 not provide additional clarity on the Advisory Group and Coordinator position by
 eliminating incorrect references to the Department of Disabilities related to staffing and
 aligning the budget appropriation with GOCI, the jurisdictional government entity;
- HB 662 would not change the annual reporting due date from July to December so that the report would align with related and companion state reporting;
- In contrast to SB 169, the Coordinator position under HB 669 would be subject to the
 Executive Nominations process. The Coordinator would also be added to the
 Interagency Disabilities Board and the Governor would be required, beginning in fiscal
 year 2024, to provide funding in the budget for a support staff position for the State
 Coordinator.
- HB 662 would not amend the Advisory Group's administrative and leadership infrastructure to comport with similar state governmental advisory groups and commissions, particularly those already in GOCI's portfolio.

Regarding the last bulleted item (above), HB 662 would not change the current provision that requires the Coordinator to serve as chair of the Advisory Group and would not establish a separate coordinator and chair. Having a different coordinator and chair as provided in SB 169 is consistent with the standard organizational structure of the commissions already under GOCI and comports with best practices recommended by the State Transparency and Accountability Reform Commission report on agency operations and structures issued in December of 2021 (report required by Executive Order 01.01.2020.05).

The Governor's Office of Community Initiatives requests that you consider this information regarding HB 662.
