I was an autistic kid predisposed to at best mediocrity, but most likely catastrophic failure, but because of how dynamic my homeschool education was I got to spend the majority of my day doing what I love. Pursuing a career in technology.

I started interning professionally at 13 during school hours, a thing most people never have the chance to do. I walked out of high school with 4 years of internships and 10,000 hours of combined professional and self directed experience.

At 23 years old I am now a small business owner with an estimated profits this year in the low 7 figures. I owe 100% of that to the flexibility my homeschool education provided.

The homeschooling I needed was even more flexible than what the average person wants, needs or gets, but it is fundamental that there is an option for people like me to have that hyper flexible learning experience.

Introducing a committee on a topic, no matter the reason, ends in more standardization of that thing. I became successful because the system was minimally standardized.

I hate the idea that some kid like me would be held back because the system that worked for me was held back from them.
