Most of us can remember a favorite book from our childhood and the flood of memories that books brings to us. We also know that reading to a child not only builds their literacy skills, it also impacts their other areas of learning such as math and science and helps build social skills and helps foster healthy emotional development.

As the Early Childhood Supervisor and Judy Center Coordinator in Somerset County, I know how important it is that children learn to love reading. On the first day of Pre-K, it is easy to spot a child who has been read to from one who has not. Can you imagine a child not knowing what to do with a book, not understanding how stories unfold and not having the closeness associated with a grown up spending the time to read a story? I truly appreciate the work of Dolly Parton's Imagination Library because it brings the opportunity to support early literacy into the lives of all of our families. Children who are registered for this program are eager to get their books each month and this program helps families build home libraries and builds a lifelong love of reading. All of the books are always high quality, early childhood books that help promote diversity, selfesteem and learning. Since 2014, Somerset County Public Schools and the Judy Center in Somerset County have partnered with the United Way of the Lower Eastern Shore to help spread the word about the importance of the Imagination Library Program. Expansion of this program would be an enormous asset to our young learners in our county. When a child comes to school, with the love of reading already planted, it makes the job of our schools so much easier. Programs such as the Imagination Library help our children come to school on the right track and ready to learn!

Dear Members of the House Ways & Means Committee,

Today, I write to advocate for House Bill 383, the Young Readers Program- Expansion Act. The Richard A. Henson Foundation, a private foundation based in Salisbury, Maryland, has been focused on supporting educational opportunities in the greater Salisbury area for more than 30 years. It is our firm belief that engaging our youth at the earliest stages of life provides a strong foundation of education and lifelong love of learning.

There has been significant data presented to our foundation to support Dolly Parton's Imagination Library. We have partnered with United Way of the Lower Eastern Shore to deliver books directly to the homes of children in our community since 2014.

Earlier this year an article published by Banner Health Center in Mesa, Arizona, stated "that eighty-five to ninety percent of a child's brain develops by age five. Specifically, this means children can grow and develop new skills quickly- from thinking and speaking skills to social and emotional skills." One of the single best things a parent or guardian can do to help a child's development is read to them every day. Reading helps develop language, social skills, and even fine motor skills.

So significant to childhood literacy is access to books, that in August of 2020, neighboring Delaware Governor John Carney committed to the launch of Dolly Parton's Imagination Library statewide through the Delaware Library System. Enrollment in the Imagination Library directly correlates to reading levels of nine and ten-year old children. The reading levels of these third graders then directly correlates to high school graduation rates and then virtually all additional positive outcomes.

Having quality books delivered directly to homes, through Dolly Parton's Imagination Library, provides the necessary resources families need to support early child development. With the passage of House Bill 383, the Young Readers Program-Expansion Act, and sending resources to the lower eastern shore, you can ensure that every child has access to books and improved development opportunities no matter the socio-economic status of the household.

Thank you for your consideration for House Bill 383 to benefit the youngest citizens in our state with enhanced literacy opportunities.
