Re: FAVORABLE WITH AMENDMENT SB 940 – Pharmacies- Prescription Drugs-Accessible Labels
for Blind, Visually Impaired, and Print Disabled Individuals

The Maryland Pharmacists Association (MPhA) has worked with bill sponsors and stakeholders towards addressing our primary concerns with the bill.

- We can support the bill if it is amended to conform to its cross-filed bill HB 456.
- The amendments strike the original bill and direct the Board of Pharmacy to develop regulations by January 2025 to address the provision of accessible labels for blind and visually impaired patients.
- The Department of Health is requested to report to the General Assembly by December 2023 on the feasibility of an enhanced dispensing fee for pharmacies that provide accessible labels and compliant packaging for the blind and visually impaired.
- Attached is the amended version of the HB 456 for the committee's reference.
- HB 456 has passed Third Reader in the House.

FOR the purpose of requiring <del>pharmacies to provide notice to customers of the availability</del>  $\mathbf{5}$ 6 of accessible labels for blind, visually impaired, or otherwise print disabled 7 individuals for prescription drugs and to provide the selected label on request; 8 establishing certain standards for accessible labels and prescription readers to be used with accessible labels; the State Board of Pharmacy to adopt regulations 9 necessary to ensure that individuals who are blind, visually impaired, or otherwise 10 print disabled have appropriate access to prescription labels, bag tags, and medical 11 12guides in a certain manner; requiring the Board to give visually impaired individuals an opportunity to provide input regarding the content of the regulations; and 13 generally relating to pharmacies and accessible labels for prescription drugs 14 15accessible prescription labels, bag tags, and medical guides for blind, visually impaired, and print disabled individuals. 16
