On behalf of the intersectional youth of Maryland, I come before the House Ways and Means Committee to support House Bill 99 to Requiring the Board of Education to require the development of "curriculum content for a half-credit course in financial literacy" (HB99). Not only does this bill emphasize the importance of laying the foundation for the next generation of informed/engaged youth, but it consistent in ensuring our students within K-12 schools are provided tools which preps them for life after graduating K-12.

As a representative democracy, we tend to get caught up in the rhetoric that our youth are our future. However, I am here to reaffirm that our youth are our now! That said, as our now, we must recognize that our NOW is currently required to take financial literacy material until they reach the 7th grade. Once completed, this course becomes an elective.
