Furthermore, it is important to note that the spawning areas of Striped Bass in the Bay are already protected through fishing restrictions, demonstrating our ongoing commitment to preserving this vital species. The proposed bill, unfortunately, overlooks the fact that catch and release practices are not the root cause of the challenges facing Striped Bass populations. Rather, it is a sustainable approach that allows us to enjoy and appreciate our natural resources without compromising their future.

In light of these considerations, I respectfully urge you to vote against the proposed bill. Doing so will not only support the sustainable practices that have long benefited our fishery but also safeguard the economic well-being of our community.
