Support

Background: Senate Bill 185 would establish Deafblind Co-Navigation Services Program in the Office of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing to provide conavigation services at no cost to deafblind individuals in the State. Additionally, it will statutorily define "co-navigation services," which are services that provide visual and environmental information or sighted services to assist with accessibility.

Written Comments: The Baltimore Jewish Council represents The Associated: Jewish Federation of Baltimore and all of its agencies. This includes the Jewish Connection Network, which has an entire department dedicated to ensuring that every member of our community, regardless of their background or abilities, can fully embrace Jewish life. Whether they need guidance, assistance, or simply a sense of belonging, JCN is available to help individuals and families facing various challenges.

The U.S. hard-of-hearing population parallels the U.S. Jewish population. And while there are no resources to correlate deaf statistics to the Jewish population, there is no reason to assume the percentage of deaf Jews is other than that of the general population. It can be estimated that 0.22 percent of U.S. Jews, more than 14,000 people, are deaf; 2.2 percent of U.S. Jews, nearly 142,000 people, have a lot of trouble hearing; and 2.05 percent of Jews worldwide, some 271,256 people, have disabling hearing impairment. Additionally, blindness due to Usher Syndrome is more common among people of Ashkenazi (eastern and central European) Jewish or French Acadian heritage than in the general population.

By supporting this legislation, you are easing the access of resources for the Deafblind community. For these reasons, the Baltimore Jewish Councils asks for a favorable report on SB185.

The Baltimore Jewish Council, a coalition of central Maryland Jewish organizations and congregations, advocates at all levels of government, on a variety of social welfare, economic and religious concerns, to protect and promote the interests of The Associated Jewish Community Federation of Baltimore, its agencies and the Greater Baltimore Jewish community.

Senate Bill 185 Office of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing – Deafblind Co–Navigation Services Program – Established Education, Energy, and the Environment Committee

Position: Favorable

The Maryland Catholic Conference (MCC) is the public policy representative of the three (arch)dioceses serving Maryland, which together encompass over one million Marylanders. Statewide, their parishes, schools, hospitals, and numerous charities combine to form our state's second largest social service provider network, behind only our state government.

Senate Bill 185 establishes the Deafblind Co-Navigation Services Program in the Office of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing to provide co-navigation services to deafblind individuals in the State.

Senate Bill 185 aims to offer co-navigation services to deafblind individuals in the State, ensuring accessibility in communication and decision-making. The services provided by Senate Bill 185 include: (I) Offering visual and environmental information or sighted services to enhance communication accessibility; (II) Delivering services in the individual's preferred language and communication mode; (III) assisting the individual in accessing their physical surroundings and making informed decisions about their environment.

Deafblindness affects approximately 2.47 million Americans, with individuals over the age of 65 constituting 63% of this community.¹ The condition creates challenges in accessing both visual and auditory information, requiring external support for understanding the surrounding environment. Senate Bill 185 seeks to bridge this gap by providing autonomy and decision-making power to the deafblind community. Currently, only 1,276 deafblind individuals nationwide are receiving co-navigation services.² The proposed program would significantly expand support, advocating for programming, services, and policies to enhance the quality of life for individuals with deafblindness. The Maryland Catholic Conference strongly supports

My name is Ed Knight. I live in Frederick, MD. I am the husband of Steven Frank, who is DeafBlind. We are both retirees living in Independent Living in a retirement community, Homewood at Frederick. I am sighted. We have been together for 41 years, and he went blind more than 20 years ago.

I am here in support of SB 185; the Co-Navigation bill. This bill is important because I am the person who ordinarily provides Co-Navigator services for Steven, and what happens if something happens to me, who will provide those services for him?

By Co-Navigator services, I mean driving him to shopping and appointments, guiding him, and doing light interpreting from ASL to English and English to tactile ASL. Although I am hearing, a Deaf person could provide Co-Navigator services just as well or better than I do.

A Co-Navigator program with the state will enable Steven to continue to remain in Independent Living if I enter the hospital, become disabled, develop dementia, or die. Even if he moved to Assisted Living, he would still need Co-Navigator services to live a full life.

Passing this bill will also improve my life by helping me avoid burn out.

We also have many friends in the DeafBlind community, and I also have concern for them and for their families.

A Co-Navigator Services program would have the added benefit of providing employment opportunities for the Deaf community as ASL users are the natural pool of talent for such a program.

I support both SB 185 and HB 98: the Co-Navigation (CN) Service Program.

I am born Deaf with the genetic I got from my DeafBlind mother, so I am second generation of Deaf with retina pigmentosa disease. I have been supporting my aged DeafBlind mother and my aged Deaf father. This has been burdening on me and I have my limits to assist them due to the injuries from auto accident and my visions. I had assisted my mother with walking, shopping, or attending social events.

She had become more frustrated and isolated for two years during COVID. She had troubling time to find someone to assist her with navigating for so many years. Unfortunately, it had led her dealing with mental health issues. It occurs to other DeafBlind individuals too.

She is not able to navigate on her own and she is required to be accompanied by someone. She was very frustrated with the Metro Access driver as driver does not know American Sign Language (ASL). She needs to have CN who can sign ASL. She is delighted to know the surroundings with the sharing information by Co-Navigator. My father has limit mobility and skills, so my mother has very limited access. She was pleased that she could go out shopping with CN and CN guided her through the aisles and products on the shelves at grocery store. It's very good stimulating to her mind and spirit.

I am pleased that my mother has gained communication access by using the Communication Facilitator (CF). She can carry conversation comfortably with her friends, family members, medical offices, etc. with an assistance by CF through video platforms. It is very important for her to have some independence to socialize or to communicate with others.

I had witnessed my DB friends having opportunities to enjoy the outdoor activities with assistance by CN by feeding them the information of surroundings and guiding them safely during walking. My DB friend had someone to accompany her while running marathons.

We need to establish the trainings for co-navigators to provide better service to DeafBlind citizens; and training for DeafBlind to know how to use Co-Navigator. The availability of training resources is essential for anyone to learn and to understand how to navigate DeafBlind properly.

I support this bill and it will relieve my concerns for my DeafBlind mother and for my future. I want to be known that Co-Navigating Service Program is out there for DeafBlind citizens in the state of Maryland and I will use this service when it is needed.

Bill Summary:

Senate Bill 185 establishes the Deafblind Co-Navigation Services Program within the Office of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing. This new program will provide co-navigation services to deafblind individuals by providing visual, environmental or sighted services to assist with communication accessibility.

Background:

Kennedy Krieger Institute provides specialized services to patients nationally and internationally. Kennedy Krieger Institute is dedicated to improving the lives of children and young adults with developmental, behavioral, cognitive and physical challenges. Kennedy Krieger's services include inpatient, outpatient, school-based and community-based programs.

The Maryland Center for Developmental Disabilities (MCDD) at Kennedy Krieger Institute is proud to be Maryland's University Center for Excellence in Developmental Disabilities Education, Research, and Service (UCEDD) and a member of the national Association of University Centers on Disabilities (AUCD).

MCDD links the community to vital services, research, and information to improve the lives of people with disabilities. Our mission is to provide leadership that advances the inclusion of people with intellectual, developmental, and other disabilities through preservice preparation and training; research and evaluation; community service and technical assistance; and information dissemination.

Rationale:

A deafblind individual is an individual that experiences some level of deafness and blindness. There are approximately 40,000 deafblind individuals in the US with 10,000 being children.¹ Inclusion and implementation of deafblind navigation services can increase safety and accessibility for deafblind individuals. Children and individuals in the deaf and hard of hearing community have higher rates of acquiring injuries due to their reduced ability to recognize or hear hazardous situations.² Communication breakdowns can occur with deafblind individuals in public settings (e.g., public transportation) particularly when crucial transportation information is not accessible to individuals with sensory impairments. Co-navigation services such as visual displays and mobile applications provided by public transit networks can help provide resources to deafblind individuals to improve safety and accessibility.³

Additionally, deafblind individuals may require the use of co-navigation services to access basic amenities like food from the grocery store or prescriptions from the pharmacy. Without co-navigation services deafblind individuals may either be dependent on a family or community member to complete those errands or unsafely navigate their community by themselves. Co-navigation services can increase independence of deafblind individuals while providing deafblind individuals the support they need to safely navigate their environment.

I am testifying as a member of the National Federation of the Blind of Maryland in support of the Co-Navigator bill SB0185/HB0098. As a Deafblind Marylander, who has received services from the former Support Service Providers (SSPs) now Co-Navigators, I know the need within the Deafblind community. Due to experiencing different degrees of vision and hearing loss, many Deafblind individuals are socially isolated from family, friends, and the communities in which they reside. COVID-19 has made this all too clear to all of us. But for those of us whose communication methods and preferences differ from society, it can be a daunting challenge.

This Bill intends to reduce those communication and navigational barriers Deafblind Marylanders encounter when they seek to engage in social discourse, purchase groceries, or attend religious services. It is important to recognize that Deaf blindness can occur across the lifespan of all ages. I lost my hearing when I was of working age, but others have lost it as children and as senior citizens. I hope that the training and recruitment of Co-Navigators goes across all counties in Maryland to ensure that Deafblind individuals in rural areas have an equal chance of obtaining Co-Navigators to suit their needs as those in urban areas.

There are two common daily events I will share in which using CoNavigators improved the situation. First, the grocery store which is close to my house is short staffed and frequently has no one to assist me in finding my groceries nor are they familiar in using my assistive listening device. The CoNavigators give me the opportunity to shop independently and use my preferred communication device without having to go into an in-depth explanation on what it is and how it works to the grocery store staff. The CoNavigators allow me to "browse items" if I am not sure what exactly I need without having the grocery staff pressuring me to hurry up. Second, when I am attending church, they orient me to the room's floor plan by describing the layout. They provide protactile communication to let me know when the speaker or audience is laughing or singing. They inform me when we are to stand and sit. This helps me feel a part of the congregation and not separate due to my Deaf blindness. They also help me locate friends to talk to after the service.

SB0185/HB0098 will enrich the lives of all Deafblind Marylanders across the state. The Co-Navigation program will help the Maryland Deafblind to achieve independence and greater autonomy. Please vote in favor of SB0185/HB0098.

Disability Rights Maryland (DRM) is the protection and advocacy organization for the state of Maryland; the mission of the organization, part of a national network of similar agencies, is to advocate for the legal rights of people with disabilities throughout the state. One of the mandated purposes of DRM's legal work is to ensure that people with disabilities are included in their communities and that they have access to the supports and services that will make living and participating in community life possible. Senate Bill 185 would further this goal by establishing the Deafblind Co-Navigation Services Program within the Office of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing to provide co-navigators to support people who are deafblind; co-navigators relay visual and environmental information to individuals who are deafblind in the individuals' preferred language and communication mode. The program would be free to individuals with deafblindness.

A co-navigator is not a decisionmaker or aide; rather, by providing information about an individual's environment and physical surroundings, the co-navigator supports the individual with deafblindness by giving them information that empowers the individuals and enables them to make decisions and live more independently.

An individual's zip code should not dictate whether they have meaningful access to the world. By dictating the creation of a statewide co-navigation program, Senate Bill 185 will promote equity by ensuring that individuals with deafblindness throughout the state of Maryland have access to co-navigators. For these reasons, DRM supports Senate Bill 185.

There are approximately 1.2 million Deaf, DeafBlind, and Hard of Hearing individuals living in the State of Maryland.

There are around 32,000 DeafBlind people living in the State of Maryland who want to live independently and safely. MDAD heard stories from individuals where their life was jeopardized when they were doing errands on their own. A Co-Navigator will provide them visual and environmental information since they cannot see and cannot hear. They need a specific person who knows how to communicate with them. Many people gave up their time and volunteered their time to support the DeafBlind Community. DeafBlind people experience challenges to ask people to support them in many ways. It is now time to recognize the needs of theirs and get people paid for the task.

Without a Co-Navigator, a DeafBlind person could be killed by the train or bus or car when they walk across the rail or street. Without one, a DeafBind person could be given the wrong medication by the pharmacy which could harm their life. Now it is the time for the State to recognize DeafBlind people's needs and we look forward to seeing the State of Maryland to be the first state to pass this kind of law.

We look forward to a favorable bill on SB 185.

The Maryland Developmental Disabilities Council (Council) is an independent public policy organization that creates change to make it possible for people with developmental disabilities to live the lives they want with the support they need. Our vision is that people with and without disabilities in Maryland live, learn, work, and play together.

WHAT does this legislation do?

- DeafBlind (Deaf-Blind, deafblind) is the term used for people with a combination of hearing and vision loss that varies for each individual. SB 185 establishes the Deafblind Co-Navigation Services Program in the Governor's Office of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (ODHH). The services would be free.
- This program uses co-navigators to support people who are DeafBlind. Co-navigators relay visual and environmental information in the preferred language and communication mode to the person who is DeafBlind. A co-navigator is not an interpreter. A co-navigator does not make decisions for the person who is DeafBlind.
- Through the Co-Navigation Services Program, people who are DeafBlind will have better access to physical surroundings and will be able to make informed decisions.

WHY is this legislation important?

- People who are DeafBlind want co-navigation services because they align with best practices.
 Advocates from the DeafBlind community support co-navigation because it promotes informed decisions and self-empowerment. Co-navigators allow people who are DeafBlind to live more independently by having greater access to the environment around them.
- A statewide program ensures equity for people who are DeafBlind across Maryland. In 2022, there were 188 children identified as DeafBlind in Maryland schools, according to the most recent data reported by the National Center on Deaf-Blindness. This report also finds that people who are DeafBlind come from all races, ethnicities, and genders. But access to supports, such as appropriate special education services in early childhood education, varies by geography. A statewide program promotes better communication accessibility for all people who are Deafblind in Maryland.

It is critical that people with disabilities have full access to the supports they need and want to thrive. This bill ensures that people who are DeafBlind receive empowering supports for independent living. For these reasons, the Council supports SB 185.

Good afternoon, Chair and distinguished members of the committee, my name is Usherla DeBerry. I have a long history providing Support Service Provider (SSP) services to the DeafBlind community. I am honored to be here on behalf of the Governor's Office of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (GODHH) as its acting director to provide testimony to support the establishment of the Co-Navigation Services Program.

The proposed bill would create a Co-Navigation Service Program within ODHH for Deaf-Blind individuals in Maryland support for visual and environmental services to assist with communication and accessibility. The office will receive requests and coordinate services with a paired/or assigned Co-Navigator. Since the Co-Navigation Program is not under ODHH's purview and in order to establish it, additional resources including identifying grants and creating a position will be required.

This afternoon, in this room, you see several DeafBlind people here in person and some who are here through Zoom. They are here seeking equity. They have been told in our community 'I do not have time to assist' or 'This is time consuming.' Additionally, there is a mother of one DeafBlind witness who will also provide a witness testimony. DeafBlind lives do impact their loved ones and should not feel a burden.

This bill empowers DeafBlind to make choices for themselves based on tactile and environmental information they receive and be able to not only participate in society but also to contribute to the society as a whole. This is a serious, dire need of access for the DeafBlind Marylanders. The DeafBlind would be able to attend a workshop, exercise regularly such as hiking, shopping, make financial transactions, to their jobs, to travel, vote, keep medical appointments and many more that we all take granted on a daily basis. The DeafBlind will be able to contribute to the local economy while being provided sighted guides who communicate accessible information to empower the DeafBlind with choices.

Recently, I worked with a DeafBlind customer transporting them to a training course related to how to use a cane. During the appointment, it was important for me to share what was happening within the environment such as facial expressions, directions, sizes, actions, layout of room, what was on the tables such as notepads/foods/drinks, people and objects. The social cues were to the 'T' explaining personal feelings, reactions and prompts on his arm and back using haptics - my customer wanted to find his DeafBlind friend and that is how this all came about to connect them. A connection then a smile was 'felt.'

GODHH has been consistent in advocating for communication access for Deaf and Hard of Hearing Marylanders and this includes the DeafBlind community. My predecessor, former director Kelby Brick, a strong advocate for our community, whose work resulted in Maryland's rank among the top states to provide American Sign Language interpreters on broadcast television during the pandemic. This is one example of the power of ending injustice embracing inclusion. It does not stop there. We shall continue the legacy of improving the lives of our DeafBlind community. After all, Governor Wes Moore has shared 'leave no one behind.'

Please support and pass this bill to increase DeafBlind's independence and to empower them to contribute to society.
