House Bill 1097

State Board of Veterinary Medical Examiners – Veterinary Technicians and Veterinary Assistants

Outline: For the purpose of authorizing a veterinary assistant to perform certain tasks under the direct supervision of a veterinary practitioner or veterinary technician; authorizing a veterinary technician to perform certain procedures, including certain emergency procedures and euthanasia, under certain circumstances; requiring the State Board of Veterinary Medical Examiners to develop by regulation a certain alternative pathway for employed veterinary assistants to become veterinary technicians; and generally relating to the State Board of Veterinary Medical Examiners and veterinary technicians and veterinary assistants.

Position: Favorable

Comments:

It's 2am on a Friday night. A young Chesapeake Bay Retriever is in surgery for a splanchnicectomy to save her life. While one patient is in surgery, an owner brings in her 19-year-old cat. The cat is open mouth breathing, and the owner is concerned about quality of life and doesn't want her cat to suffer anymore. The doctor on duty is performing lifesaving surgery and now must decide which patient to help.

This scenario is all too common in our veterinary ERs. If the doctor steps away from the surgery, the patient might not make it. If the doctor continues in with the surgery the other patient waits in agony, for what could be hours. No matter what, the doctor's stress and anxiety has drastically increased. Today's increased stress and anxiety is just compounded interest to a career that is full of burnout and compassion fatigue.

House Bill 1067 hopes to make at least this scenario a little better. It would allow licensed technicians in an emergency to stop a patient's suffering. A licensed technician with support of the veterinarian and owner can help make this difficult situation less stressful and bring peace to a suffering patient while ensuring the doctor stays focused on the lifesaving surgery.

I used the word patient, but these are family members. We often see these family members in the worst situations. Our goal is to be as safe and humane as possible. We want to do as much suffering as possible while simultaneously reducing the amount of suffering.

I am also in favor of the timeline of October 1, 2027, for the bill to go into full effect. Our local program at the Community College of Baltimore County and the online program Penn Foster usually takes 24 months (about 2 years) to complete. Completion of this program culminates in the VETERINARY TECHNICIAN NATIONAL EXAM. The passage of this exam results in becoming a fully licensed veterinary technician.

SHORT TITLE: State Board of Veterinary Medical Examiners - Veterinary Technicians and Veterinary AssistantsMDA POSITION: SUPPORT WITH AMENDMENTS

The State Board of Veterinary Medical Examiners (SBVME) supports the amended language of Section 1 in the proposed HB1097. The Board greatly appreciates the clear definitions for each degree of supervision, which is an area in need of clarification. The Board also appreciates the bill's added definition of veterinarian assistants and its description of the specific healthcare tasks that may be delegated to veterinary assistants and veterinary technicians under specified levels of supervision. The bill's sponsor has worked with all parties to fine tune these duties in a way that will elevate the profession of Registered Veterinary Technician and support hospital operations.

During the discussions, the bill's sponsor confirmed that Section 2, regarding an alternative licensing pathway, was intended to be removed during the amendment process in the House Subcommittee. Unfortunately, this amendment did not make it into the final draft of the Bill before it crossed over.

The SBVME's current regulations in COMAR 15.14.13.03B (discussed below), already offer an alternative pathway for practicing veterinary assistants who have not graduated (or are not candidates for graduation) from a veterinary technology program approved by the AVMA to become RVTs. The SBVME's existing similar pathway for veterinary assistants to become licensed is based on clinical experience. Veterinary assistants who have not graduated from an accredited Veterinary Technology program can apply to become RVTs by submitting the following:

- a. A transcript showing they have received any associate degree including the following courses:
 - i. Biology I;
 - ii. Biology II;
 - iii. Microbiology;
 - iv. Chemistry;

- v. Anatomy and Physiology I; and
- vi. Anatomy and Physiology II. (Does not require a full Veterinary Technicians/Technology Degree)
- b. Proof of 10,000 hours of work experience as a technician. (4.5-5 years working full time)
- c. A Skills Assessment completed by a Licensed veterinarian (Similar to the recommendations from a practicing veterinary practitioner)
- d. 24 hours of Veterinary Technician Continuing Education
- e. Proof of 24 hours of experience at an emergency facility.

The pathway currently described in Section 2 of HB1097 would put a significant burden on the State Board of Veterinary Medical Examiners staff and likely be used very infrequently in the limited amount of time that it would be in effect. The Board would need to draft new regulations creating the pathway, submit work orders through the Department of Information Technology (DoIT) for creating the alternative pathway, and go through the testing and evaluation process of the new application. This would require several months' worth of work assigned to a minimal staff with an already increasing workload, including the need to adjust the existing regulations that would be required in Section 1 of HB1097. It would also require significant effort and work orders to close this pathway in 2027 when the pathway is set to expire.

The Board also believes that despite the significant effort that would be required to implement the pathway it would impact very few constituents. The alternative pathway would require a person to have been previously licensed and/or credentialed in another jurisdiction and then move to Maryland and work under a Maryland Veterinarian's supervision as an assistant for 2 years before they could get a letter of recommendation submitted for their application to become a Registered Veterinary Technician. We believe that there would be very few individuals that would qualify for this pathway. Many states do not license individuals through alternative pathways so those individuals would already be required to have graduated from a Veterinary Technology program and may use that path. Of those that do come from states with alternative pathways, many would have the 5 years of required experience from the state they are relocating from and opt to be Registered in Maryland through the existing pathway, rather than wait two years working as an assistant to be able to get the letter of recommendation.

In summary, the State Board of Veterinary Medical Examiner's hopes for a favorable report to HB 1097 with an amendment to remove Section 2 requiring a temporary alternative pathway be created.
