For the record, my name is Tameka D. Barber, and I am a Maryland resident residing in Owings Mills, MD. I write this letter in strong support of House Bill 1051.

In 2009, 2010, and 2015, I gave birth to my daughters at MedStar Southern Maryland Hospital. My doctor within the Capital Women's Care medical group was incredible. All three pregnancies were considered high-risk, but I have been blessed to have excellent medical care with my current doctor. Before finding my current doctor, I unfortunately experienced disrespectful and poor medical care at Civista.

I could not find a medical report card, which will now be required as a part of the bill. I simply ended up there through a Google search. I was misdiagnosed and told due to my race, my high blood pressure symptoms went unnoticed, and I was told to simply change my diet. I also walked into a walking rotation of doctors and had to re-explain my situation every week, which added more anxiety and stress to an already sensitive situation. I was not properly educated or advised on what to look for and how to handle things at home.

At the beginning of my second trimester, I was frustrated and switched to Capital Women's Care and my current doctor. At this point, she took immediate action ensuring that my care and my baby's care was a priority, and helped to successfully manage my blood pressure. She also ensured I was fully educated on pregnancy-induced hypertension and ways to manage my stress levels and blood pressure even after each pregnancy.

The medical report card for Capital Women's Care and MedStar Southern Maryland hospital was a vital part of my research and knowing that she would be there and has delivered all three of my daughters is a blessing. My care team has been amazing each time because she advocated for me.

I am comforted knowing that in your bill, the medical report care with patient input, is a requirement and not an option that can lead to saving moms and babies across the state.

Thank you for your time. I urge you to return a favorable report for House Bill 1051.
