I strongly support HB34 because it would facilitate interstate practice.

Good afternoon, Chair Joseline A. Pena-Melnyk, Vice Chair Bonnie Cullison Rosapepe, and House and Health and Government Operations Committee members. My name is Angelica Thomson, and I live in District 8. As a single mother of two children, it is challenging for me to balance my academic pursuits and head-of-household responsibilities. I have always aspired to be a social worker as I witnessed the needs of my community. However, pursuing this dream has proven to be financially challenging due to the high cost of tuition, living expenses, and licensing requirements. Despite these difficulties, social work is a noble career choice, even though social workers often struggle to make ends meet with their salaries and domestic responsibilities.

HB 34 is a unique legislative proposal aimed at assisting social workers and those who aspire to become social workers. The proposal acknowledges the difficulties faced by social workers in balancing their professional goals with personal responsibilities, such as spending quality time with their families. Furthermore, social workers often face financial challenges due to their low salaries and the high cost of being licensed in multiple states. Therefore, we seek your support for HB 34, as it aims to address these issues.

HB 34 aims to solve the challenges faced by social and behavioral workers when they move from one state to another or when they need to be licensed in multiple states to perform their job. It establishes a coordinated data system and a streamlined process for the recognition of licenses, which makes it easier for them to continue providing continuity care to students who relocate for college and increases care in underserved areas. Additionally, HB 34 assists spouses of active military by allowing social work spouses to continue providing virtual services or start a new job right away, even if their spouse is deployed to another state. I urge a favorable report on HB34.
