

**Written Testimony Submitted for the Record to the Maryland House of Delegates
Ways and Means Committee - Public and Nonpublic Schools - Auto-Injectable Epinephrine and
Bronchodilators - Use, Availability, Training, and Policies - SB0180

Free State PTA represents over 70,000 volunteer members and families in over 500 public schools. Free State PTA is composed of families, students, teachers, administrators, and business as well as community leaders devoted to the educational success of children and family engagement in Maryland. As the state's premier and largest child advocacy organization, Free State PTA is a powerful voice for all children, a relevant resource for families, schools and communities and a strong advocate for public education. ***Senate Bill SB0180, Public and Nonpublic Schools - Auto-Injectable Epinephrine and Bronchodilators - Use, Availability, Training, and Policies, aligns with Free State PTA's principle for legislative action which states that schools must provide a safe environment where all students, teachers and staff can thrive.***

A founding principle of Free State PTA's (FSPTA) mission is to promote the safety and well-being of all children and youth. This bill requires school systems to establish a policy to obtain, administer, and train school nurses and other school personnel to administer a bronchodilator in emergency situations when a child is in respiratory distress. One quarter of high school students in Maryland have reported having asthma and one third of high school students in Baltimore City as detailed in the Maryland Youth Risk Behavior Survey. We have an obligation to keep these children safe in school settings.

Because children are in school much of their lives, a severe reaction may be experienced in a school setting. I know of a child that was 8 years old when their parents were called by the school nurse that he was coughing persistently and not feeling well. His oxygen level was down to 92%. This could have been a dangerous situation. He was diagnosed with asthma and subsequently prescriptions were brought to school. Children like him would be better served if school trained personnel were authorized to administer emergency medication when distress is identified.

Free State PTA believes this bill is vital in ensuring the wellbeing of children and therefore, strongly urges that this committee issues a **favorable report on SB180**. Ellie Mitchell and Rick Tyler, representing the Maryland Education Coalition, sign onto this testimony.
