HB 423 Montgomery County – Voting Methods MC 1-24

Please vote an **UNFAVORABLE** report for **HB 423**.

Consistency

Judges of the Circuit Court, State's Attorney, Register of Wills and Sheriff should be elected by a voting method used consistently statewide – the individual receiving the most votes in Round 1 (plurality).

If a county or municipality chooses to move to Ranked-Choice Voting (RCV), the change in voting method should be confined to those offices specific to the jurisdiction.

A review of jurisdictions across the United States currently using RCV shows that the majority apply it only to elections or mayor and council (or equivalent). Specific to HB 423, if implemented, RCV should be limited to County Executive, members of the County Council, and members of the Board of Education.

Cost of Implementation

The bill does not address the cost (how much, who pays) of a change to RCV.

- Existing voting machines cannot accommodate a RCV ballot (sample ballot -page 2).
- New York City's 2021 RCV education campaign cost in excess of \$15 million.

Election Integrity


- HB 423 -- Pg 2 Lines 24-25 "Any other provision" is extremely broad.
 - o Who determines the certification criteria for the tabulation equipment?
 - Does this allow the county to extend voting rights to non-citizens?
- Programming errors can lead to miscounts.
- Voters may view their vote "wasted" if they voted for a Round 1 "winner" who did not win ≥ 50% and then loses in a subsequent round.
- The time to vote a RCV ballot can increase dramatically when ranking multiple candidates for each office rather than just 1, creating longer lines at the polls.
- How much will RCV delay the final vote?
 - Can a Round 2 count begin before all mailed, overseas, and provisional ballots have been received and opened?
 - Will that delay increase concerns about election security (ballots appear, disappear, get lost)?
