Demographic Data Collection – Parental Status

<u>The MLLC supports HB298 – Maryland Higher Education Commission – Demographic Data</u> Collection – Parental Status, 2025.

The MLLC is a bipartisan group of Senators and Delegates committed to supporting legislation that improves the lives of Latinos throughout our state. The MLLC is a crucial voice in the development of public policy that uplifts the Latino community and benefits the state of Maryland. Thank you for allowing us the opportunity to express our support of HB298.

This bill requires the Maryland Higher Education Commission to collect data on the parental status of students enrolled in public higher education institutions within the state. Public institutions must gather and report demographic information regarding whether students are parents or guardians, the ages of their children, and the nature of their caregiving responsibilities, including whether they are single parents or share responsibilities. Public institutions must integrate these questions into their demographic data collection processes and report findings to the Commission. Starting September 1, 2026, and annually thereafter, the Commission will submit a summary report of the data to relevant legislative committees.

This bill is relevant to the Latino Caucus because collecting this information will enable schools to provide more effective support for students with parental responsibilities. Since Latino students are disproportionately more likely to balance education with caregiving¹, this initiative would directly address their unique needs and ultimately contribute to their long-term success in higher education.

For these reasons, the Maryland Legislative Latino Caucus respectfully requests a favorable report on HB298.
