

**Senate Bill 599 Behavioral Health Crisis Response Grant Program - Funding**

**Position: SUPPORT**

The Mental Health Association of Maryland is a nonprofit education and advocacy organization that brings together consumers, families, clinicians, advocates and concerned citizens for unified action in all aspects of mental health and substance use disorders (collectively referred to as behavioral health). We appreciate the opportunity to provide this testimony in support of Senate Bill 599.

SB 599 will provide level funding for Maryland's Behavioral Health Crisis Response Grant Program for the next three years. This program, established by the General Assembly in 2018, awards grants to local behavioral health authorities to develop and expand crisis response services in jurisdictions across the state. It is currently supporting the following critical crisis response needs:
