

Testimony prepared for the Economic Matters Committee on House Bill 220

February 20, 2025 Position: **Favorable**

Mr. Chairman and members of the Committee, thank you for this opportunity to speak about wise stewardship of the gift of creation. I am Lee Hudson, assistant to the bishop for public policy in the Delaware-Maryland Synod, <u>Evangelical Lutheran Church in America</u>. We are a faith community with three judicatories located in every part of our State.

The ELCA identified greenhouse gases as environmental pollutants because of their deleterious effects on climate in 1993 ("Caring for Creation," ELCA). We have supported a swift transition to an energy production regime sourced from renewables, in Maryland and in other states.

While biomasses are regular byproducts of several agricultural and natural resource industries, and thus renewable by some measure, they still generate greenhouse gas when burned. Burning them, while "renewable" in that expanded definition, still frustrates the effort to reduce carbon emissions.

And amply recurring material such as packaging wastes culled from trash and burned to produce "energy" eludes any current definition of "renewable" excepting that they are and will remain plentiful. Burning trash was never going to produce "clean energy".

After a quarter century it's time to clean up Maryland's energy portfolio. We therefore support **House Bill 220** and implore your favorable report.
