The Pyramid Healthcare, Inc. ("Pyramid Healthcare") family of companies submits the following testimony urging the Committee to favorably report SB 140, An Act Concerning Overdose Awareness Day. Doing so will support Marylanders struggling with substance use disorder ("SUD") challenges related to the opioid epidemic.

Pyramid Healthcare is an integrated behavioral healthcare system serving Medicaid and commercial clients in 8 states across a continuum of residential and outpatient substance use disorder ("SUD"), mental health, autism, and eating disorder treatment services. We employ over 3,600 team members across our 80+ active facilities which treat approximately 14,000 clients on any given day. In Maryland, we operate five locations serving over 2,000 residents per year: a withdrawal management & residential treatment center and an outpatient treatment center in California, a withdrawal management & residential treatment center in Charlotte Hall, and a withdrawal management & residential treatment center in Joppa. In January 2025, our new Prince George's County facility began treating clients. That facility will ultimately offer approximately 75 withdrawal management & residential SUD treatment beds for adult residents of Prince George's County and throughout central Maryland. In total, we have almost 275 licensed SUD residential treatment beds for adult Medicaid clients across the state.

For the first time, deaths from drug overdoses have finally declined. Still, nearly 100,000 Americans die every year from fentanyl and other opioid overdoses. These declines are due to the many years of hard work improving access to treatment, especially for those who are covered by Medicaid. Now is not the time to give up the fight which has realized such positive results.

Please consider this feedback and favorably adopt SB 140 to make August 31st Overdose Awareness Day in Maryland and to address substance use disorders and, specifically, the ongoing opioid epidemic. Thank you for your support of mental health and substance use disorder treatment providers in Maryland and for considering our policy proposals and recommendations on behalf of Pyramid Healthcare. SB 140 - Overdose Awareness Day

Behavioral Health System Baltimore (BHSB) is a nonprofit organization that serves as the local behavioral health authority (LBHA) for Baltimore City. BHSB works to increase access to a full range of quality behavioral health (mental health and substance use) services and advocates for innovative approaches to prevention, early intervention, treatment and recovery for individuals, families, and communities. Baltimore City represents nearly 35 percent of the public behavioral health system in Maryland, serving over 100,000 people with mental illness and substance use disorders (collectively referred to as "behavioral health") annually.

Behavioral Health System Baltimore supports SB 140 – Overdose Awareness Day. This bill directs the Governor to proclaim August 31 as Overdose Awareness Day in recognition of the thousands of Marylanders who have lost their lives due to overdose.

The number of overdose deaths in Maryland has skyrocketed in recent years. About 2,500 people in Maryland died of fatal overdose in 2023, including 1,000 who die in Baltimore City. There are promising signs that overdose declined in 2024, but fatalities are still many times higher than they were ten years ago. This loss of life remains staggering and deserves attention.

Overdose Awareness Day is an internationally recognized day of remembrance for all those impacted by addiction and overdose epidemic. Honoring this day can help raise awareness of this terrible crisis and send a strong message of hope and healing to those struggling with addiction.

The friends and family of those who have lost their lives to overdose also deserve to have their grief recognized and their lost loved ones deserve to be remembered. BHSB urges the Senate Education, Energy, and the Environment Committee to support SB 140.

Re: TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT of Senate Bill 140: Overdose Awareness Day

Dear Chair Feldman, Vice Chair Kagan, and Members of the Committee,

While Howard County saw a 85% percent decrease in nonfatal overdoses from 2018 through 2024, and a 43% decrease in fatal overdose during the same time period, drug overdoses continue to hit our Maryland communities hard. Recent data from Maryland's Overdose Data Dashboard shows that each year, thousands of Marylanders continue to fall victim to overdoses.

Senate Bill 140 would require the Governor to annually proclaim August 31st as Overdose Awareness Day, part of a global effort to end overdoses. Since I took office in 2019, Howard County opened Howard House, Hilda's Place, and Highland House, which are all treatment houses for men and women recovering from substance misuse disorders. We also opened Sheppard Pratt's new campus in Elkridge, which contains 17 medically managed detox beds for people with co-occurring mental health challenges.

I remain committed to expanding access to life-saving treatment and developing solutions to have a more robust overdose response strategy. We have invested \$1.5 million in residential treatment facilities to create a continuum of care that funds case managers, peer support specialists and a reliable transportation network. In 2023, I created the Opioid Collaborative Community Council to assist in determining how the county should use \$12.3 Million in funds received through a National Settlement Agreement with opioid manufacturers and any future settlements. Howard County also provides nearly \$600,000 annually to support behavioral health navigation. Finally, during the past year, our Health Department has trained nearly 2,000 people in its Overdose Response program, which includes naloxone administration. They also distributed over 2,100 naloxone kits last year alone.

Howard County proudly hosts its own International Overdose Awareness Day event every year, which brings together partners throughout the community to honor the individuals we have lost to overdose. Howard County's event also provides an opportunity for people to receive information on available treatment and recovery resources, naloxone and other harm reduction training, and to meet people in recovery who are residing in Howard County's halfway houses.

The Maryland Department of Health (Department) respectfully submits this letter of support for Senate Bill (SB) 140– Overdose Awareness Day. SB 0140 will require the Governor to annually announce August 31st each year as Overdose Awareness day.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Maryland reported approximately 2,800 drug overdose deaths in the 12 month period ending in June 2024. TESTIMONY - SENATE BILL 140 OVERDOSE AWARENESS DAY EDUCATION, ENERGY, & THE ENVIRONMENT COMMITTEE MARCH 13, 2025

Chair Feldman, Vice Chair Kagan and Committee Members:

Senate Bill 140 is a very straightforward bill that simply requires the Governor to annually proclaim August 31st as Overdose Awareness Day.

Each year Maryland loses thousands of residents to drug overdoses and drug-related death. The purpose of this legislation is to clearly enshrine August 31st as a date to recognize those deaths and this epidemic and to encourage those currently suffering to seek support and treatment.

As someone who spent the majority of his professional career in law enforcement, I have seen firsthand the impact that drug addiction can have on individuals and to their loved ones. Reducing the stigma attached to seeking treatment for addiction would save countless lives. I am hopeful that declaring August 31st as Overdose Awareness Day would be a means to reduce said stigma and to quell the suffering of those who are addicted and those who love them.

For the reasons listed above, I ask for a favorable report of Senate Bill 140.

Senate Bill 140 - Overdose Awareness Day Support

NCADD-Maryland strongly supports Senate Bill 140 to officially recognize August 31st as Overdose Awareness Day in Maryland. Since 2001, communities worldwide have observed this day to remember those lost to overdoses and to raise awareness about the ongoing crisis. Every year, events are held in cities and towns across the globe to honor lives lost, support those affected, and advocate for policies that improve prevention, treatment, and recovery efforts.

Maryland continues to face a significant public health challenge due to drug overdoses. According to the Maryland Department of Health's latest data, from February 2024 to January 2025, there were 1,499 total overdose deaths in the state, with 1,255 deaths related to opioids and 1,145 linked specifically to fentanyl. Cocaine-related overdoses accounted for 736 deaths, highlighting the prevalence of polysubstance use. These figures underscore the need for continued investment in education, prevention, and intervention efforts. Establishing Overdose Awareness Day will send a strong message that the state is committed to addressing this crisis, supporting affected families, and ensuring that resources reach those in need.


Encouragingly, recent data suggests that Maryland is making progress in reducing overdose deaths. Overdose fatalities declined by 34.8% in 2024, marking a significant improvement after years of increases. This positive trend reflects the effectiveness of public health initiatives, harm reduction programs, and policy interventions that have been implemented to combat substance use disorder. However, the crisis is far from over, and continued awareness and action are necessary to sustain this momentum. Recognizing Overdose Awareness Day at the state level will help reinforce the importance of these efforts while providing an annual opportunity to educate the public and honor the lives lost.


One of the most significant barriers to addressing substance use disorder is the stigma that prevents individuals from seeking help. Many people struggling with addiction experience feelings of shame, guilt, and isolation, making it more difficult for them to access treatment and support. Overdose Awareness Day will serve as a platform to educate communities about addiction as a medical condition, reduce stigma, and foster an environment in which individuals feel safe seeking help. It will also provide an opportunity to support families and friends who have lost loved ones to overdose, recognizing their grief and acknowledging the devastating impact of substance use disorder on communities across Maryland.

Dear Chair, Vice Chair, and Members of the Committee:

On behalf of the Recovery Housing & Treatment Centers Coalition of Maryland (RHTC), we write to express strong support for Senate Bill 140 (SB140), which would require the Governor to annually proclaim August 31 as Overdose Awareness Day. RHTC is a coalition of recovery residences, group homes, treatment centers, and other critical services that form the backbone of Maryland's continuum of care. Our mission is to educate policymakers, stakeholders, and the general public on the importance of maintaining and expanding recovery facilities and services in our state. We work to ensure that individuals in recovery have access to high-quality, stable housing and treatment options that support their long-term well-being and reintegration into the community.

SB140 is a critical step in addressing the overdose epidemic. This bill is not merely symbolic; it represents a crucial step toward raising awareness, reducing stigma, and strengthening community engagement in combatting the opioid crisis. Maryland is not immune to the opioid crisis gripping our nation. In 2024, Maryland experienced a significant 38% reduction in fatal overdoses, with 1,553 deaths compared to 2,511 in 2023¹. This decline is largely attributed to the state's comprehensive approach to substance use treatment, which offers various levels of care tailored to meet individuals' specific needs. In Anne Arundel County, programs like the Department of Health's Overdose Response Training provide community members with education on recognizing and responding to overdoses, including the administration of naloxone—a life-saving medication that can quickly restore breathing during an opioid overdose. Additionally, community initiatives and funding opportunities which collaborate with local agencies to develop strategies aimed at reducing overdoses in their communities. These targeted efforts have been instrumental in addressing the opioid crisis and reducing overdose fatalities across the state.

RHTC supports SB140 because Overdose Awareness Day aligns with our mission to provide recovery support and advocate for those in need. By recognizing August 31 officially, Maryland will reinforce its commitment to those in recovery, ensuring access to resources, education, and support services for individuals overcoming addiction.
