The Maryland Department of the Environment (MDE) SUPPORTS HB 1367.

Bill Summary

HB 1367 institutes a civil penalty not-to-exceed \$50,000 for a person who falsifies information in a lead—contaminated dust testing report.

Position Rationale

Establishing a penalty for fraudulent lead inspection reporting is essential to deter inaccurate reporting and maintain the credibility and reliability of the lead testing system in Maryland. Falsifying reports not only jeopardizes public health but also undermines the efforts of public health officials working to prevent lead poisoning. Fraudulent reports can lead to unsafe living conditions for tenants and residents, particularly children and pregnant women who are at the highest risk for lead exposure. Suspected fraudulent reporting investigations are resource intensive as MDE must notify property owners and tenants of the potential or actual fraud and the associated risks. These investigations can divert valuable resources from the core mission of lead poisoning prevention. Investigating fraudulent reports adds an administrative burden to MDE and can delay the identification of actual lead hazards. By establishing clear and substantial penalties for fraud, HB 1367 would ensure that MDE can focus resources and better protect public health.

Conclusion

HB 1367 would enhance the state's lead poisoning prevention efforts by imposing strong penalties for fraudulent lead inspection reports and ensure that the health and safety of Marylanders is protected from the dangers of lead exposure. The measures outlined in the bill are critical for maintaining transparency, accountability, and trust in the lead testing process. Accordingly, MDE asks for a **FAVORABLE** report for HB 1367.

Dear Chairman Smith and Members of the Committees:

The Green & Healthy Homes Initiative (GHHI) writes in support of House Bill 1367. I serve as Chair of the Maryland Lead Poisoning Prevention Commission and as a member of the EPA Children's Health Protection Advisory Committee and the CDC Lead Exposure and Prevention Advisory Committee. GHHI has a long-standing history of advocating for families and children on the important issue of lead poisoning prevention and addressing healthy homes hazards. GHHI has been at the frontline of lead poisoning prevention for over three decades in helping to elevate Maryland as a national leader by working to reduce childhood lead poisoning by 99% in the state. GHHI also provides tenant's rights assistance statewide and legal representation of tenants for the repair of lead hazards and other hazardous conditions in homes.

In 2012, the CDC determined that there is no safe level of lead in a child's body at which harm does not occur. Lead poisoning causes learning disabilities, loss of IQ, speech development problems, attention deficit disorder, higher school dropout rates and violent, aggressive behavior that disproportionately impacts older, low-income communities in Maryland. Despite our progress, Maryland annually still has over 1,300 children identified with elevated blood lead levels.

The Maryland Reduction of Lead Risk in Housing Law relies on the validity of the private inspection process in order for the law to be effective. Our children, parents and families depend on it. If lead inspectors are permitted to falsify inspection records, sampling results and lead certifications, the whole system unravels.

HB1367 will address this problem by imposing civil penalties on inspectors who knowingly falsify certificates to demonstrate compliance with Maryland environmental regulatory requirements. Civil fines are needed for inspectors who falsify inspection certification information to serve as a deterrent to that unlawful and illegal behavior. Strong oversight and enforcement is critical to protecting the integrity of the lead inspection certification system in the Maryland's lead laws.

The Maryland Department of the Environment has played a leading governmental role in implementing the law. Without substantial enforcement and accountability measures, the underpinnings of environmental laws and the balances struck in those laws will be greatly compromised. GHHI applauds MDE for taking its recent enforcement actions against inspection companies that are not following the required State of Maryland lead inspection protocols or falsifying inspection documents. It is important that MDE has sufficient staffing resources and the legal authority needed through civil penalties to have consequences for inspectors and their companies when MDE spot checks and oversight uncovers fraudulent activities.

GHHI supports HB1367 and the creation of strong civil fines for inspectors who engage in unlawful actions. These civil fines must be significant enough to deter future inspectors from being willing to place monetary gain over the undermining of Maryland's lead laws and the placing of young children and pregnant women at risk. While Maryland Environment Article Section 6-850 does contain civil fines currently, HB1367 is needed to address a loophole in the current statute that only imposes those civil fines on the rental property owner. HB1367 will address this deficiency by also imposing civil fines on the lead inspector who engages in the prohibited conduct.

Lead inspectors who falsify lead inspections and certifications are deceiving unsuspecting parents into thinking the homes they are moving their families into are safe. These fraudulent certificates put rental homes that contain lead hazards and are out of compliance with Maryland's Risk Reduction Certification standards on the market. This legislation will establish important civil penalties for inspectors who are falsifying lead inspection results and certificates and undermining the integrity of the Maryland Reduction of Lead Risk in Housing Law.

We request a Favorable Report on HB1367.

House Bill 1367 arises from a reported incident, where those responsible for lead testing were able to duck accountability for falsifying information reported to the Department of the Environment. Specifically, HB 1367 would penalize a violator \$50,000 for falsifying information on a lead testing report, and each day that this forgery occurs would be treated as a separate violation. The Lead Poisoning Prevention Commission, ("Lead Commission") established under Environment Article 6, Subtitle 8, advises the Maryland Department of the Environment, the Legislature, and the Governor regarding lead poisoning prevention in Maryland. The Lead Commission supports state and local lead poisoning prevention strategies that help to detect and eliminate environmental lead hazards, especially when children are at risk. Following a vote of the Maryland Lead Poisoning Prevention Commission in favor of HB1367 on March 6, 2025, the Lead Commission submits this testimony in support of HB1367.

HB1367 would impose civil penalties on inspectors who knowingly falsify certificates to demonstrate compliance with Maryland environmental regulatory requirements. Civil fines are needed for inspectors who falsify inspection certification information to serve as a deterrent to that unlawful behavior. The integrity of the inspection process is paramount to the entire system of checks and balances that have been created to protect the legitimacy of lead inspection certification and oversight of the Maryland Reduction of Lead Risk in Housing Law. If inspectors commit fraud by falsifying information, the entire system collapses.

The Maryland Department of the Environment (MDE) has played a leading governmental role in implementing the law and enforcement power has been a significant tool in their arsenal. Without strong enforcement and accountability measures, the underpinnings of environmental laws and the balances struck in those laws will be greatly compromised. The recent enforcement actions by MDE against inspection companies that are not following the required State of Maryland lead inspection protocols or falsifying inspection documents are critical to an effective inspection, spot check and oversight process.

Civil fines for inspectors are necessary to ensure that the cost of committing fraud is higher than any potential reward. HB1367 is necessary because the current statute's civil fines structure in Environment Article Section 6-850 places the fines on the rental property owner and does not impose fines on the lead inspector.

When inspectors falsify lead inspections and certifications, they place young children in Maryland at risk of lead exposure in homes that contain lead hazards that parents unknowingly believe to be lead free or in compliance with Maryland's Risk Reduction Certification standards. The CDC has determined that there is no safe level of lead in a child's body at which harm does not occur. Lead poisoning from primarily lead in paint, dust and contaminated soil contributes to significant learning disabilities, loss of IQ, speech development problems, attention deficit disorder, poor school performance and violent, aggressive behavior that heavily burdens low-income communities in Maryland.

This legislation will establish important civil penalties for inspectors who are falsifying lead inspection results and certificates and undermining the integrity of the Maryland Reduction of Lead Risk in Housing Law. The Maryland Lead Commission requests a favorable report on HB1367.
