Planned Parenthood of Maryland (PPM) supports *House Bill 380 – Criminal Law - Prohibition on Sale of Contraceptives and Contraceptive Devices by Vending Machine in School - Repeal.* This bill removes an outdated prohibition on, and criminal penalty related to, selling or offering contraceptives/contraceptive devices in vending machines in Maryland schools.

Currently, more than 284,000 women in Maryland live in contraceptive deserts.¹ This bill will dramatically improve access to contraception in Maryland by increasing both the number of places individuals can purchase contraception and by allowing for contraception to be available in places where young people congregate. According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, access to family planning and contraceptive services ranks as one of the 10 greatest achievements made in public health during the 20th century.² This is largely due to the several public health and socio-economic benefits associated with access to contraception – including higher educational attainment, better career outcomes, higher earnings, and a dramatic reduction in poverty rates, according to the Institute for Women's Policy Research.³ When communities decrease the incidence of unintended pregnancy, there are clear socio-economic benefits.
