RE: Letter of Support for HB499 - Expungement Reform Act of 2025

Dear Chairman Clippinger and Members of the House Judiciary Committee,

As the State's Attorney for Baltimore City, I write to express my strong support for House Bill 499 – the Expungement Reform Act of 2025. This legislation represents a meaningful step toward creating a more just and equitable legal system by ensuring that individuals who have paid their debt to society have a fair opportunity to move forward with their lives.

HB499 makes critical improvements to Maryland's expungement laws by streamlining the process for individuals seeking a second chance. Specifically, this bill:

- Reduces waiting periods for filing expungement petitions based on the completion of a sentence, including probation and parole.
- Expands the list of eligible misdemeanor convictions for expungement.
- Requires courts to assess a petitioner's ability to pay restitution before granting expungement, ensuring that financial hardships do not permanently bar individuals from relief.
- Prohibits Maryland Judiciary Case Search from displaying records of cases that resulted in acquittals, dismissals, or nol pros, as well as certain pardoned convictions.

In Baltimore City, many individuals face lifelong barriers to employment, housing, and economic stability due to past convictions, even after demonstrating rehabilitation and full compliance with their sentences. The reforms in HB499 will allow more Marylanders to reintegrate into society as productive citizens, reducing recidivism and strengthening our communities.
