

Written Testimony in Opposition to HB 1554/SB 1045: Proposed 2.5% Business Services Tax

I am Keith Whisenant representing Palmer Gosnell Hospitality and I am writing today to express strong opposition to House Bill 1554 and Senate Bill 1045, which propose a 2.5% sales tax on business-to-business services. This legislation, if enacted, would significantly increase operational costs for Maryland businesses, undermine their competitiveness, and ultimately harm the state's economic growth.

Impact on Small Businesses and Professional Services

Small businesses, which are the backbone of our economy, operate on thin margins and rely heavily on outsourced services such as accounting, payroll, and IT support. The proposed tax would force these businesses to either absorb the additional costs or pass them on to consumers, leading to higher prices and reduced competitiveness. This is particularly concerning for professional services firms, as it would make Maryland less attractive compared to neighboring states like Virginia and Delaware, where such services are not taxed.

Competitive Disadvantage and Economic Consequences

Instead of imposing a new tax that would drive businesses away, Maryland should focus on sustainable budget solutions that foster economic growth and competitiveness.
