

Testimony of the Mayor and Council of Rockville HB 997 – Admissions and Amusement Tax – Food and Beverages SUPPORT

Good afternoon, Chair Atterbeary and members of the House Ways and Means Committee. The Rockville Mayor and Council appreciate the opportunity to provide written comments on HB 997. We are thankful to Delegate Spiegel for sponsoring this important legislation.

The Mayor and Council, in concert with the Maryland Municipal League (MML), strongly support HB 997. Maryland municipalities have few options for raising revenue to adequately cover the cost of service provision to our communities. HB 997 expands the ability of municipalities to raise resources beyond the property tax by expanding the Admissions and Amusement Tax to capture revenue from food and beverage for all on-site consumption, which includes restaurants. The bill provides enabling authority for local governments to charge up to 3% for on-site food and beverage purchases.

We support the provisions of HB 997, for the following reasons:

- It provides enabling authority for municipalities to increase revenues, which is critically important given inflationary pressures, contract cost increases, supply chain issues, and other factors making it more costly to provide services to our residents and businesses. Keep in mind every municipality will not necessarily enact the legislation.
- The expanded revenue tool will bolster the ability of municipalities to make necessary investments in critical services provision, such as policing, street and sidewalk maintenance, parks maintenance, and recreational programing for youth, adults, and seniors.
- The bill will help to reduce pressures to adjust property tax rates in the long term.

HB 997 is a positive first step for Maryland municipalities to have revenue tools that generate resources needed to provide excellent services to our communities. According to a recent study completed by MML, Maryland's municipalities are a major engine of the State, with a total of over \$5.7 billion in economic output. The ability to raise revenue is critical for municipalities to continue this trend. For these reasons we urge the Committee to provide HB 997 with a favorable report. Thank You.
