Re: HB 373 State Board of Dental Examiners Disciplinary Action and Unannounced Inspections
Dental Board – Letter of Support

Dear Chair Bagnall and Members of the Health Committee:

The Maryland State Board of Dental Examiners is submitting this Letter of Support for HB 373 State Board of Dental Examiners Disciplinary Action and Unannounced Inspections. The bill accomplishes two things. First, it updates the name of an existing Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) publication, it adds a second publication, ensuring that the Board may move forward with enforcement proceedings, and secondly, it enables the Board to take disciplinary action against expanded function dental assistants when warranted.

I. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention

The stated purpose of the CDC it is to protect public health and safety in the United States by preventing, detecting, and responding to health threats. It focuses on developing and applying disease control and prevention strategies, promoting health, and ensuring the health and safety of the population, including those in dental settings. The Annotated Code of Maryland, Health Occupations Article, §§ 4-205 and 315 refer to “the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention’s guidelines on universal precautions.” The name has changed, and there is an additional CDC publication relevant to appropriate infection control guidelines in dental settings. The title of the publication “Centers for Disease Control and Prevention’s guidelines on universal precautions” has been changed to “Centers for Disease Control and Prevention’s guidelines on Standard Precautions.” The additional publication is titled “Centers for Disease Control and

Prevention's Guidelines for Infection Control in Dental Health-Care Settings." Both publications establish appropriate guidelines for infection control in dental settings.

The Board is concerned that an individual who might face disciplinary charges involving a violation of CDC standards might allege that since the name of the publication with which he or she is charged no longer exists, charges must be dismissed. In addition, the Board wishes to utilize the publication Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Guidelines for Infection Control in Dental Health-Care Settings when evaluating infection control issues in dental offices.

II. Expanded Function Dental Assistants:

Under HB 968 Health Occupations – Dental Assistants – Certification and Regulation (2022), two new dental assistant certifications were created in Maryland; general duties expanded function dental assistants and orthodontic expanded function dental assistants. HB 968 does not permit the Dental Board to take administrative action against expanded function dental assistants who violate the Board's laws and regulations. Under HB 968 disciplinary action may only be taken against the supervising dentist. HB 573 and SB 792 State Board of Dental Examiners – Expanded Function Dental Assistants – Education and Reinstatement (2025) is silent as to disciplinary action. As a result, expanded function dental assistants may repeatedly violate the dental laws without repercussion in one or more dental offices. Under the existing laws administrative action may be taken against all other license and certificate holders; that is, dentists, dental hygienists, and dental radiation technologists. It is manifestly unfair to allow individuals who are trained in expanded function duties, and who are Dental Assisting National Board certified to lawfully escape all responsibility for bad acts. Therefore, the Board asks for the statutory authority to initiate administrative action against expanded function dental assistants when warranted.

For the foregoing reasons the Dental Board requests that HB 373 receive a favorable report.
