Public Health - Maryland Department of Health - Reports on Standing Orders 3 and Opioid Overdose Reversal Drugs - Standing Orders

FOR the purpose of requiring a licensed health care provider, when issuing a standing order
for an opioid reversal drug, to allow an individual to choose any formulation of any
opioid reversal drug approved by the federal Food and Drug Administration;
requiring the Maryland Department of Health, on or before certain dates, to report
to certain committees of the General Assembly on opioid overdose reversal drugs and
standing orders; and generally relating to reports on standing orders for and opioid
overdose reversal drugs.

21 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,

6 [(3)] (1) Any licensed health care provider who has dispensing authority
7 also may dispense an opioid overdose reversal drug approved by the federal Food and Drug
8 Administration to any individual in accordance with a standing order issued by a licensed
9 health care provider with prescribing authority in accordance with this subsection.

10 (c) A pharmacist may dispense opioid overdose reversal drugs approved by the 11 federal Food and Drug Administration in accordance with a therapy management contract 12 under Title 12. Subtitle 6A of the Health Occupations Article.

13 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 14 October 1, 2024.
