The Doleman Black Heritage Museum's future home project envisions transforming the former Coca-Cola bottling company at 465 Pennsylvania Avenue, Hagerstown, MD, into a multifunctional space serving as a cafe, art museum, and event venue. This ambitious initiative aims to honor and celebrate the invaluable contributions, lifestyles, triumphs, and struggles of the descendants of enslaved African American people throughout American history. The revitalization project will breathe new life into the historic building, preserving its essence while incorporating innovative and sustainable design elements. One distinctive feature is the use of sea container construction material in the new building, symbolizing resilience and adaptability while promoting eco-friendly practices. The art museum within the complex will be the heart of the space, housing a diverse and comprehensive collection of artifacts, artworks, and historical records.
