A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 Osteoporosis Community Education and Prevention Program

3 FOR the purpose of requiring the Secretary of Health and Mental Hygieneto establish a

- 4 certain osteoporosis education and prevention program in the Department of
- 5 Health and Mental Hygiene; specifying the design of the program; authorizing the
- 6 Secretary to make certain grants for certain programs related to osteoporosis
- 7 education and prevention efforts; requiring the Secretary to appoint certain
- 8 advisory committee; and generally relating to establishing a certainosteoporosis
- 9 education and prevention program.

10 BY adding to

- 11 Article Health General
- 12 Section 13-801 through 13-803, inclusive, to be under the new subtitle "Subtitle 8.
- 13 Osteoporosis Community Education and Prevention Program"
- 14 Annotated Code of Maryland
- 15 (1994 Replacement Volume and 1995 Supplement)
- 16 Preamble

WHEREAS, 25 million Americans are stricken with osteoporosis - a preventable
disorder which occurs most frequently among older people, causing loss of bone mass;
and

20 WHEREAS, Experts estimate that, in the United States, one in two women and one 21 in five men will suffer a bone fracture because of osteoporosis; and

- 22 WHEREAS, Nationally, osteoporosis results in 1.5 million fractures of the hip,
- 23 spine, wrist, and other bones, with a cost of at least \$18 million in heath care and
- 24 associated expenses; and

25 WHEREAS, Osteoporosis is frequently a silent, undiagnosed disease, affecting

- 26 apparently healthy individuals, which only becomes apparent when the individual suffers
- 27 an unexpected broken bone often as a result of a trivial event, such as a hug or a hard28 sneeze; and

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WHEREAS, Osteoporosis, if allowed to progress undetected to the point of bone
 fracture, can and frequently does cause disability and institutionalization, thereby
 reducing the quality and length of the individual's life and exacting aheavy toll in
 increased health costs; and

5 WHEREAS, Although there is presently no cure for osteoporosis, medical experts 6 agree that prevention, early diagnosis, and treatment can reduce the prevalence of this 7 devastating disease; and

8 WHEREAS, Many people, even medical experts, are not aware of the crucial need 9 to educate people, particularly women, of the preventive steps, such asadequate calcium 10 intake, continued exercise throughout life, and, in the case of older women, estrogen 11 replacement therapy under appropriate circumstances; and

WHEREAS, The safe and painless tests of bone mass measurement shouldbe
publicized among physicians and the public in order to reduce the costly effects of broken
bones resulting from osteoporosis; and

WHEREAS, Current expert thinking emphasizes the need to educate young people
in this regard so that such young people will take the steps to build and preserve strong
bones throughout their lives; and

18 WHEREAS, If the public can be made aware of the simple solutions to prevention 19 of this devastating disease, osteoporosis is preventable and the costs of long-term care 20 among older Americans will be reduced; now, therefore,

21 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF22 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

23 Article - Health - General

SUBTITLE 8. OSTEOPOROSIS COMMUNITY EDUCATION AND PREVENTION
 PROGRAM.

27 THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY FINDS THAT:

(1) THE PROTECTION, IMPROVEMENT, AND PRESERVATION OF THE
PUBLIC HEALTH IS ESSENTIAL TO THE GENERAL WELFARE OF THE CITIZENS OF
THIS STATE;

(2) OSTEOPOROSIS, IF ALLOWED TO PROGRESS UNDETECTED TO THE
POINT OF BONE FRACTURE, CAN AND FREQUENTLY DOES CAUSE DISABILITY AND
INSTITUTIONALIZATION, THEREBY REDUCING THE QUALITY AND LENGTH OF AN
INDIVIDUAL'S LIFE AND EXACTING A HEAVY TOLL IN INCREASED HEALTH CARE
COSTS; AND

36 (3) DISEASE PREVENTION AND EDUCATION ABOUT OSTEOPOROSIS IS
 37 ESSENTIAL BECAUSE OSTEOPOROSIS IS PREVENTABLE IF DETECTED EARLY.

2 (A) THE SECRETARY SHALL:

3 (1) ESTABLISH IN THE DEPARTMENT A COMPREHENSIVE4 OSTEOPOROSIS EDUCATION AND PREVENTION PROGRAM; AND

5 (2) DESIGN THE PROGRAM FOR IMPLEMENTATION ON A REGIONAL,6 DISTRICT, OR LOCAL LEVEL.

7 (B) THE PROGRAM SHALL:

8 (1) INCLUDE INFORMATION ON THE CAUSES, PREVENTION, EARLY9 DETECTION, AND TREATMENT OF OSTEOPOROSIS; AND

10 (2) ENCOURAGE THE COORDINATION OF LOCAL AND PRIVATE SECTOR 11 HEALTH EDUCATION SERVICES ON OSTEOPOROSIS.

(C) THE SECRETARY MAY AWARD GRANTS FOR THE PROVISION OF WORK
 SITE HEALTH PROMOTION PROGRAMS ON OSTEOPOROSIS THAT MAY INCLUDE
 ON-SITE HEALTH EDUCATION AND SCREENING EFFORTS AND INFORMATION
 ABOUT HEALTH RISK BEHAVIORS LINKED TO OSTEOPOROSIS.

THE SECRETARY SHALL APPOINT AN ADVISORY COMMITTEE OF LOCAL
 MEDICAL EXPERTS TO PROVIDE ADVICE TO THE SECRETARY ON THE
 DEVELOPMENT AND DELIVERY OF THE COMPREHENSIVE OSTEOPOROSIS
 PREVENTION AND EDUCATION PROGRAM REQUIRED UNDER § 13-802 OF THIS
 SUBTITLE.

22 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 23 October 1, 1996.

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
