CHAPTER _____

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Disease Prevention - Rabies - Ferrets**

3 FOR the purpose of excluding domestic ferrets from the animals that the Secretary of
4 Health and Mental Hygiene may find to be dangerous to human health and safety;
5 requiring certain ferrets to be vaccinated against rabies; requiring a person that
6 owns or keeps a ferret to submit proof of vaccination with an application for county
7 registration or licensing; requiring a licensed veterinarian who vaccinates a ferret to
8 provide the owner with a certain vaccination certificate; requiring the quarantine of
9 certain animals that have been vaccinated against rabies that bite or expose a
10 human to rabies under certain circumstances; ~~limiting the authority of a public~~
11 ~~health veterinarian or local health officer to destroy an animal for rabies testing to~~
12 ~~animals clinically suspected of rabies~~; and generally relating to the vaccination and
13 rabies testing of dogs, cats, and ferrets.

19 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
20 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

1 **Article - Health - General**

2 18-219.

3 (a) The Secretary may prohibit the importation, selling, trading, purchasing,
4 bartering, breeding, raising, keeping, or possession of any animals found to be dangerous
5 to human health and safety.

6 (b) This section does not apply to:

7 (1) Domestic cats;

8 (2) Domestic dogs;

9 (3) DOMESTIC FERRETS;

10 (4) Animals used for agricultural purposes;

11 [(4)] (5) Animals used for scientific purposes;

12 [(5)] (6) Animals used for educational purposes;

13 [(6)] (7) Animals used for public exhibitions; or

14 [(7)] (8) Any animal that the Secretary determines is not a threat to human
15 health and safety.

17 (a) Each person who owns or keeps a dog [or], cat [or both], OR FERRET that
18 is 4 months old or older shall have the dog [or], cat, OR FERRET vaccinated adequately
19 against rabies.

20 (b) (1) A county may not register or license a dog [or], cat, OR FERRET unless
21 the person who owns or keeps the dog [or], cat, OR FERRET submits, with the
22 application for registration or license, proof that the dog [or], cat, OR FERRET has been
23 vaccinated adequately against rabies.

24 (2) The public health veterinarian shall determine the proof of vaccination
25 that is acceptable.

26 18-319.

27 (a) A licensed veterinarian who vaccinates a dog [or], cat, OR FERRET against
28 rabies:

29 (1) May select the vaccine to be used;

30 (2) Shall administer the vaccine in a manner that is consistent with the
31 recommendations of the National Association of State Public Health Veterinarians;

32 (3) Shall issue to the owner of the dog [or], cat, OR FERRET a vaccination
33 certificate, on the form that the Department approves; and

34 (4) Shall keep a record of the vaccination for a period of 5 years.

1 (b) The information in the rabies vaccination record that a licensed veterinarian
2 keeps may not be used:

3 (1) To license the dog [or], cat, OR FERRET; or

4 (2) To tax the owner of the dog [or], cat, OR FERRET.

14 ~~OF THIS SECTION~~ that bites a human or otherwise exposes a human to rabies shall be
15 quarantined ~~AS PROVIDED IN SUBSECTION (C)~~ (B) OF THIS SECTION.

16 ~~(C)~~ (B) AN ANIMAL UNDER QUARANTINE SHALL BE QUARANTINED in a
17 place, which may include the residence of the owner, in the manner designated by the
18 local health officer or the public health veterinarian for a suitable period as determined
19 by the health officer or the public health veterinarian.

20 ~~{(b)} (D)~~ (C) (1) At any time during the quarantine period, the public health
21 veterinarian or local health officer may order the owner of a biting animal to have the
22 animal monitored for rabies by a licensed veterinarian.

23 (2) The owner of the animal shall pay for the cost of any examination or
24 other associated cost.

25 ~~{(e)} (E)~~ (D) An animal under quarantine may not be moved from the place of
26 quarantine without the written permission of the local health officer or public health
27 veterinarian.

28 ~~{(d)} (F)~~ (E) The public health veterinarian or local health officer OR THE
29 DESIGNEE OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH VETERINARIAN OR LOCAL HEALTH OFFICER may
30 order the immediate and humane destruction of a biting animal ~~THAT IS CLINICALLY~~
31 ~~SUSPECTED TO BE RABID~~ for rabies testing if:

32 (1) It is necessary to preserve human health;

33 (2) A licensed veterinarian determines that a quarantined animal is
34 inhumanely suffering; or

35 (3) The animal is considered wild and is not claimed by an owner within 24
36 hours.

37 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
38 October 1, 1996.
