CHAPTER _____

1 AN ACT concerning

2 Baltimore City Schools - Funding

 $3\,$ FOR the purpose of authorizing, ratifying, and sanctioning a reduction in the State share

4 of basic current expenses for elementary and secondary education for he City of

5 Baltimore by a certain amount for a certain fiscal year, contingent upon receipt of

6 certain information; clarifying legislative intent; and providing for the effective date

7 of this Act.

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Preamble

9 WHEREAS, The Maryland General Assembly remains concerned about the 10 progress of the Baltimore City Public Schools (BCPS) in implementing a plan of school 11 management reforms, including the creation of a network of enterprise schools; and

12 WHEREAS, The Maryland General Assembly remains concerned about the 13 ability of the Baltimore City Public Schools (BCPS) leadership to manage State and local 14 resources and the impact that deficiency has on the classroom and student performance 15 of BCPS students; and

WHEREAS, Although progress is being made in certain areas, for the sixth consecutive year, the 1995 Maryland School Performance Report indicatesthat performance of BCPS students was far lower, and in some areas declining, when compared to the performance of students in similarly challenged jurisdictions and

20 students statewide; and

WHEREAS, In 1991, in consultation and cooperation with the Board ofSchool
 Commissioners and the superintendent, Associated Black Charities commissioned an
 international management consulting firm, Towers Perrin/Cresap, to conduct a

4 management study of the BCPS; and

5 WHEREAS, The final report released in June, 1992, raised serious issues about 6 the management of the BCPS and offered numerous recommendations and strategies to 7 restructure the management system into a network of enterprise schools, in which 8 resources are focused at the school level and principals are given greater authority to 9 manage their schools; and

WHEREAS, In August, 1992, the superintendent of the BCPS endorsed all but six
of the Cresap recommendations to restructure the BCPS' management system into a
network of enterprise schools, and appointed an implementation team andan enterprise
school group to oversee implementation; and

WHEREAS, In April, 1993, the Maryland General Assembly endorsed the Cresap
report by including a provision in the State budget bill requiring the BCPS and the
Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) to enter into a three-year agreement
to monitor and evaluate the implementation of the Cresap recommendations, including
the recommendation to implement a merit-based, systemwide personnel evaluation
system for teachers, principals, and administrators; and

WHEREAS, In July, 1993, the agreement was signed by the State Superintendent and the BCPS superintendent, with the caveat that recommendations deemed imperiate or not feasible, based on a written explanation by the BCPS, would not be simplemented, and a requirement that MSDE and the BCPS mutually agree on the selection of a third party to conduct an independent evaluation of BCPS' progress in implementing the recommendations by June 30, 1994; and

WHEREAS, In January, 1994, a public meeting was held to hear a report on the BCPS' progress at which the private sector team leaders appointed by MSDE to help the BCPS facilitate the implementation of the Cresap recommendations revealed that few recommendations, if any, had been implemented, and that planning, coordination, and clear lines of responsibility were lacking on the part of the BCPS; and

WHEREAS, In June, 1994, the BCPS and MSDE mutually agreed to retain MGT
 of America, Inc., a Florida consulting firm with experience in education issues, to
 evaluate the BCPS' progress in implementing the Cresap recommendations;and

WHEREAS, In January, 1995, at a public hearing, MGT presented its report on BCPS' progress revealing that 39 of the 53 major Cresap recommendationshad not been implemented and cited the major barriers to implementation as: no master plan for rimplementation; confusion among school and central office administrators about the Cresap report; inadequate, fragmented, poorly coordinated training efforts; sweeping changes in senior level staff within the BCPS; and the disbanding of the BCPS groups responsible for implementation oversight; and

41 WHEREAS, At the same public hearing, the superintendent of the BCPS 42 responded to the MGT report by implying that the Cresap recommendationswere for the

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1 purpose of providing guidance only and there was no intention of implementing all of the 2 recommendations to which the BCPS and MSDE earlier agreed; and

WHEREAS, The BCPS' poor management practices likely contribute to the
unacceptable level of student performance and efforts by private sectorvolunteers,
independent consultants, the MSDE, and the Maryland General Assembly have failed to
motivate action by the BCPS; and

7 WHEREAS, In April, 1995, the Maryland General Assembly included a provision 8 in the State budget bill withholding \$5,873,943 from the Fiscal Year 1996 appropriation 9 for the State share of basic current expenses for the City of Baltimorepending receipt of 10 a report from the Maryland State Department of Education evaluating whether the BCPS 11 has made substantial progress in implementing the Cresap recommendations, including a 12 systemwide personnel evaluation system; and

13 WHEREAS, The Fiscal Year 1996 State appropriation for education aid for14 Baltimore City is \$423.6 million, or 20 percent of the appropriation statewide; and

WHEREAS, \$5,873,943 is the amount estimated to be 25 percent of Baltimore
City's expenditures for salaries, wages, and benefits for administration for the BCPS for
Fiscal Year 1996; and

WHEREAS, The action of withholding \$5,873,943 from the City of Baltimore is consistent with provisions included in State budget bills to withhold up to 25 percent of the salary of State administrators deemed to be responsible for poor compliance with State laws, rules, and regulations governing fiscal administration practices; now, therefore,

SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
MARYLAND, That, notwithstanding any other provision of law, if the Maryland State
Department of Education has not reported by January 31, 1996, that the Baltimore City
Public Schools has made substantial progress toward implementing the Towers
Perrin/Cresap recommendations, including implementing a merit based, systemwide
personnel evaluation system, for Fiscal Year 1996 only, the State shareof basic current
expenses as provided under § 5-202(b) of the Education Article for the City of Baltimore
shall be reduced by \$5,873,943, and the corresponding reduction in thisappropriation for
the State share of basic current expenses is hereby authorized, ratified, and sanctioned.

32 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That if the State share of 33 basic current expenses for the City of Baltimore is reduced in accordance with Section 1 34 of this Act, it is the intent of the General Assembly that the City of Baltimore reduce by 35 \$5,873,943 the budget for salaries, wages, and benefits classified as expenditures for 36 administration for the Baltimore City Public Schools.

37 SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect38 April 15, 1996.

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
