## A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

### 2 Education - Required School Days and Hours - Exception

3 FOR the purpose of allowing a county board of education or the Board ofSchool

- 4 Commissioners of Baltimore City, for the 1995-1996 school year only,to alter the
- 5 number of days and hours that schools are required to be open; specifying that the
- 6 approval of the State Board of Education is not required for a reduction of days or
- 7 hours under this Act; providing that funding from State or local sources may not be
- 8 reduced because of a reduction of days or hours under this Act; and making this Act
- 9 an emergency measure.

10 BY repealing and reenacting, without amendments,

15 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF

16 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

17 Article - Education

18 7-103.

(a) Except as provided in subsections (b) and (e) of this section, each public20 school under the jurisdiction of a county board:

(1) (i) Shall be open for pupil attendance for at least 180 actual school
days and a minimum of 1,080 school hours during a 10-month period in each school year;
or

24 (ii) If normal school attendance is prevented because of conditions
25 described in subsection (b) of this section, shall be open for at least1,080 hours during a
26 10-month period; and

27 (2) Shall be open for pupil attendance a minimum of 3 hours during each28 school day; and

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(3) May not be open on Saturdays, Sundays, or holidays in order to meet the 180 day or 1,080 hour requirement of this subsection.			
3 (b) (1) If a county board submits a written application to the StateBoard that 4 describes a demonstrated effort by the county board to comply with subsection (a) of this 5 section, the State Board may permit:			
6 (i) Adjustments in the length of the school year;			
7 (ii) Exceptions from the requirement that the school year be 8 completed within a 10-month period;			
9 (iii) Adjustments in the length of the school day; and			
10 (iv) Schools to be open on holidays.			
<ul><li>(2) These adjustments may be granted only if normal school attendance is</li><li>prevented because of:</li></ul>			
13 (i) Natural disaster;			
14 (ii) Civil disaster; or			
(iii) Severe weather conditions.

<ul> <li>(e) (1) The county boards of Allegany, Anne Arundel, Calvert, Howard, and</li> <li>Montgomery Counties, and the Board of School Commissioners of BaltimoreCity, may</li> <li>elect to operate one or more schools within the county or Baltimore City on a year-round</li> <li>basis, provided that the 180 day and the minimum hour requirements under this section</li> <li>are met.</li> </ul>			
21 22	<ul><li>(2) Nothing in this section precludes a county board from conducting a</li><li>year-round pilot study or program that is funded by the county board.</li></ul>

AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That, notwithstanding § 7-103</li> <li>of the Education Article, for the 1995-1996 school year only, the board of education of a</li> <li>county or the Board of School Commissioners of Baltimore City may reduce the minimum</li> <li>number of days and hours that schools in the jurisdiction shall be open. The approval of</li> <li>the State Board of Education is not required for a reduction in the number of days or</li> </ul>		

28 hours authorized by this Act. Education funding from State or local sources may not be29 reduced because of a reduction in the number of days or hours made under this Act.

30 SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act is an emergency 31 measure, is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health and safety, has 32 been passed by a yea and nay vote supported by three-fifths of all the members elected to 33 each of the two Houses of the General Assembly, and shall take effect from the date it is 34 enacted.
