- 22 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
- 23 MARYLAND, That Section(s) 7-203.1 of Article Education of the Annotated Code of
- 24 Maryland be renumbered to be Section(s) 7-203.2.
- 25 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the Laws of Maryland
- 26 read as follows:

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1 Article - Education

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- 3 (a) The State Board, the State Superintendent, each county board, and each
- 4 public school shall implement a program of education accountability forthe operation
- 5 and management of the public schools.
- 6 (b) The education accountability program shall include the following:
- 7 (1) The State Board and the State Superintendent shall assist each county
- 8 board to establish educational goals and objectives that conform with statewide
- 9 educational objectives for subject areas including reading, writing, and mathematics;
- 10 (2) With the assistance of its county board, each public schoolshall survey
- 11 current student achievement in reading, language, mathematics, and other areas to assess
- 12 its needs;
- 13 (3) Each public school shall establish as the basis for its assessment of its
- 14 needs, project goals and objectives that are in keeping with the goals and objectives
- 15 established by its county board and the State Board;
- 16 (4) With the assistance of its county board, the State Board, and the State
- 17 Superintendent, each public school shall develop programs to meet its needs on the basis
- 18 of the priorities it sets;
- 19 (5) Evaluation programs shall be developed at the same time to determine if
- 20 the goals and objectives are being met; and
- 21 (6) A reevaluation of programs, goals, and objectives shall be undertaken
- 22 regularly.
- 23 (c) National standardized testing may not be the only measure for evaluating
- 24 educational accountability.
- 25 (d) The Department shall assist each county board to establish an education
- 26 accountability program by providing:
- 27 (1) Guidelines for development and implementation of the program by the
- 28 county boards; and
- 29 (2) Assistance and coordination where it is needed and requested by the
- 30 county boards.
- 31 (e) The State Superintendent shall send the Governor and, subject to § 2-1312 of
- 32 the State Government Article, the General Assembly a report each January that includes:
- 33 (1) Documentation of the progress of the Department, the countyboards,
- 34 and each public school in this State towards their respective goals and objectives; and
- 35 (2) Recommendations for legislation that the State Board and the State
- 36 Superintendent consider necessary to improve the quality of education in this State.

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	(f) On the recommendation of the State Superintendent, the State Board shall include in its annual budget request the funds it considers necessary to carry out the provisions of this section.
