- 4 FOR the purpose of establishing a Maryland Port Commission Alcohol-Freeand
- 5 Drug-Free Workplace Program; establishing procedures to prevent alcohol and
- drug abuse by certain workers at port facilities in the State; establishing procedures
- 7 for alcohol and drug testing, rehabilitation, and sanctions of certain employees;

- 25 WHEREAS, The State of Maryland has a significant interest in maintaining a safe,
- 26 hazard-free working environment in the ports and harbors of the State through programs
- 27 to ensure that alcohol and substance abuse problems among port facilityworkers are
- 28 discouraged, identified, and treated; and
- WHEREAS, Modern port facilities include sophisticated machinery that require
- 30 highly skilled, attentive workers to operate the functions of the portsand harbors; and

SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF RYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:
Article - Transportation

(a) In this title the following words have the meanings indicated.
(b) "Administration" means the Maryland Port Administration.
(c) "Commission" means the Maryland Port Commission.
(d) "Executive Director" means the Executive Director of the Maryland Port ninistration.
(e) "Port facility" includes any one or more or combination of:
(1) Lands, piers, docks, wharves, warehouses, sheds, transit sheds, elevator pressors, refrigeration storage plants, buildings, structures, and other facilities, artenances, and equipment useful or designed for use in connection with the ation of a port;
(2) Every kind of terminal or storage structure or facility useful or designed use in handling, storing, loading, or unloading freight or passengers at marine sinals;
(3) Every kind of transportation facility useful or designed for use in aection with any of these; and
(4) An international trade center constituting a facility of commerce and isting of one or more buildings, structures, improvements, and areas that the artment considers necessary, convenient, or desirable for the centralized mmodation of functions, activities, and services for or incidental to the transportation ersons by water, the exchange, buying, selling, and transportation of commodities and reproperty in international and national waterborne trade and commerce, the notion and protection of this trade and commerce, and governmental services related tem and other federal, state, and municipal agencies and services, including foreign erzones, offices, marketing and exhibition facilities, terminal andtransportation ities, customhouses, custom stores, inspection and appraisal facilities, parking areas, modity and security exchanges, and, in the case of buildings, structures, rovements, and areas in which such accommodation is afforded, all the buildings, structures, improvements, and areas might not be devoted to purposes of the buildings, structures, rovements, and areas might not be devoted to purposes of the international trade the other than the production of incidental revenue available for the expenses and incial obligations of the Department in connection with the international trade center although other parts of the buildings, structures, improvements, and areas might be

(A) (1) IN THIS SECTION THE FOLLOWING WORDS HAVE THE MEANINGS 8 INDICATED. 9 (2) "COMMITTEE" MEANS AN ALCOHOL-FREE AND DRUG-FREE 10 WORKPLACE COMMITTEE WITH A MEMBERSHIP CONSISTING OF AN EQUAL NUMBER 11 OF EMPLOYEE AND MANAGEMENT REPRESENTATIVES APPOINTED BY THE 12 COMMISSION TO ADMINISTER THE PROGRAM. 13 (3) "DRUG" MEANS: (I) A CONTROLLED DANGEROUS SUBSTANCE AS DEFINED IN 14 15 ARTICLE 27 OF THE CODE: AND 16 (II) A PRESCRIPTION DRUG AS DEFINED IN § 21-201 OF THE HEALTH 17 - GENERAL ARTICLE, TO THE EXTENT THAT THE DRUG AFFECTS JOB 18 PERFORMANCE AND WORKER SAFETY AT A PORT FACILITY. 19 (4) "EMPLOYEE" MEANS ANY INDIVIDUAL WHO IS AN EMPLOYEE, 20 INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR, SUBCONTRACTOR, OR OTHER INDIVIDUAL WHO 21 PROVIDES LABOR FOR COMPENSATION AT A PORT FACILITY FOR A PERSON. 22. (5) "PROGRAM" MEANS THE MARYLAND PORT COMMISSION 23 ALCOHOL-FREE AND DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE PROGRAM THAT MEETS THE 24 REQUIREMENTS OF THIS SECTION. - 38 (3) PROVIDE FOR REHABILITATION PROGRAMS AND DISCIPLINARY
- 39 AND SANCTION PROCEDURES FOR INDIVIDUALS WHO VIOLATE THE PROGRAM;

- 1 (4) PROVIDE SUFFICIENT NOTICE TO EMPLOYEES OF TESTING
- $2\,$  PROCEDURES, CONSENT, AND OTHER REQUIREMENTS OF THE PROGRAM;
- 3 (5) PROVIDE ADEQUATE SECURITY MEASURES FOR COLLECTION,
- 4 CHAIN OF CUSTODY, AND HANDLING OF TEST MATERIAL; AND
- 5 (6) ESTABLISH PROCEDURES FOR THE REPORTING, REVIEW, AND
- 6 APPEAL OF TEST RESULTS.
- 7 (D) THE PROGRAM SHALL GENERALLY COMPLY WITH THE GUIDELINES FOR
- 8 A DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE PROGRAM ESTABLISHED BY THE MARYLAND CENTER
- 9 FOR WORKPLACE SAFETY AND HEALTH.
- 10 (E) A MEMBER OF A LABOR ORGANIZATION OR OTHER GROUP OF
- 11 EMPLOYEES AT A PORT FACILITY THAT IS SUBJECT UNDER A LABOR AGREEMENT
- 12 OR CONTRACT TO AN ALCOHOL AND DRUG PROGRAM THAT GENERALLY
- 13 CONFORMS TO THE PROVISIONS OF THIS SECTION SHALL BE DEEMED TO BE IN
- 14 COMPLIANCE WITH THE REQUIREMENTS, TESTING PROCEDURES, AND OTHER
- 15 PROVISIONS OF THIS SECTION.

- 19 requirements, or regulations adopted for the Maryland Port Commission Alcohol-Free
- 20 and Drug-Free Workplace Program may not exceed the standards or requirements for
- 21 alcohol and drug testing that have been established through the labor and management
- 22 agreement for the Port of Baltimore that was implemented on January 1, 1993, known as
- 23 the "Management International Longshoremen's Association Program for Drug and
- 24 Alcohol Abuse".
- 25 SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
- 26 October 1, 1996.
