 (f) (1) An amount as determined in paragraph (2) of this subsection shall annually be set aside from the State shares of basic current expense aid to each county; these amounts are to be utilized for [vocational-technical] CAREER AND TECHNOLOGY education programs in accordance with guidelines adopted by the State Board of Education. These funds shall not be used to supplant local contributions for [vocational-technical] CAREER AND TECHNOLOGY EDUCATION programs. 3 4	(e) (1) The 15 members from the general public shall be chosen from different geographical areas of the State.

7 8	(ii) 1 shall be a private citizen with special knowledge or expertise relating to services to individuals with disabilities;
9	(iii) 1 shall be from the business community;
