- 8 procedures for meetings of the task force; and generally relating tostudying and
- 9 developing ideas and strategies to reduce the incidence of osteoporosis among
- 10 citizens of Maryland.
- 11 WHEREAS, 25 million Americans are stricken with osteoporosis a preventable
- 12 disorder which occurs most frequently among older people, causing loss of bone mass;
- 13 and
- WHEREAS, Experts estimate that, in the United States, one in two women and one
- 15 in five men will suffer a bone fracture because of osteoporosis; and
- WHEREAS, Nationally, osteoporosis results in 1.5 million fractures of the hip,
- 17 spine, wrist, and other bones, with a cost of at least \$18 million in health care and
- 18 associated expenses; and
- 19 WHEREAS, Osteoporosis is frequently a silent, undiagnosed disease, affecting
- 20 apparently healthy individuals, which only becomes apparent when the individual suffers
- 21 an unexpected broken bone often as a result of a trivial event, such as a hug or a hard
- 22 sneeze; and
- 23 WHEREAS, Osteoporosis, if allowed to progress undetected to the point of bone
- 24 fracture, can and frequently does cause disability and institutionalization, thereby
- 25 reducing the quality and length of the individual's life and exacting aheavy toll in
- 26 increased health costs: and
- 27 WHEREAS, Although there is presently no cure for osteoporosis, medical experts
- 28 agree that prevention, early diagnosis, and treatment can reduce the prevalence of this
- 29 devastating disease; and
- 30 WHEREAS, Many people, even medical experts, are not aware of the crucial need
- 31 to educate people, particularly women, of the preventive steps, such asadequate calcium

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	intake, continued exercise throughout life, and, in the case of older women, estrogen replacement therapy under appropriate circumstances; and					
	WHEREAS, The safe and painless tests of bone mass measurement shouldbe publicized among physicians and the public in order to reduce the costly effects of broken bones resulting from osteoporosis; and					
	WHEREAS, Current expert thinking emphasizes the need to educate young people in this regard so that such young people will take the steps to build and preserve strong bones throughout their lives; and					
	WHEREAS, If the public can be made aware of the simple solutions to prevention of this devastating disease, osteoporosis is preventable and the costs of long-term care among older Americans will be reduced; now, therefore, be it
