HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION ____

- 1 A House Joint Resolution concerning
- 2 Workplace Health and Physical Fitness Wellness Month
- 3 FOR the purpose of calling on the Governor to designate October 1996 as Workplace
- 4 <u>Health and Physical Fitness Wellness Month; and generally relating to the</u>
- 5 promotion of physical fitness and wellness.
- 6 WHEREAS, Regular exercise improves the ability to perform on and off the job, 7 reduces stress, and enhances self-image; and
- 8 WHEREAS, Both scientific and subjective evidence indicate a positive correlation
- 9 between regular exercise and good nutrition and individual health status; and
- 10 <u>WHEREAS, The Office of the U.S. Surgeon General has reported that regular</u>
- 11 exercise has a favorable effect on weight loss, mood, incidence of heart disease,
- 12 progression of diabetes, and certain cancers; and
- 13 WHEREAS, The American Heart Association has recently identified physical
- 14 inactivity as a major controllable risk factor for heart disease; and
- 15 <u>WHEREAS</u>, Premature employee death costs the American industry \$20 billion
- 16 dollars a year; and
- 17 WHEREAS, A 3-year study by the Steelcase Company showed that medical
- 18 claims costs were 55% lower for participants in corporate fitness programs compared to
- 19 nonparticipants; and
- WHEREAS, General Electric reduced health care costs for members of its fitness
- 21 program by 38% over 18 months while nonmember's health care costs rose 21%; and
- WHEREAS, The Canadian Life Assurance Company reported that 47% of fitness
- 23 program participants were more alert, had better rapport with coworkersand supervisors,
- 24 and enjoyed work more than nonparticipants, that 63% of participants indicated that they

- 1 were more relaxed, more patient, and less tired during the work day, and that fitness
- 2 participants showed a 32.4% lower incidence of turnover over 7 years; and
- 3 WHEREAS, The Dallas, Texas Police Department reported a 29% decreasein
- 4 sick leave for fitness program participants while nonparticipants showed a 5% increase;
- 5 and
- 6 WHEREAS, The American Journal of Health Promotion reported that the Coors
- 7 Brewing Company saved \$1,400,000 over 6 years as a result of a corporate fitness
- 8 program, that General Mills experienced a 19% drop in absenteeism for fitness program
- 9 participants, and that DuPont showed a 14% reduction in absenteeism; and
- WHEREAS, Tenneco found that participants in a wellness program are 13% less
- 11 likely to leave employment than nonparticipants and that better personnel were attracted
- 12 because of the wellness program; and
- WHEREAS, Commercial Magazine reported that General Motors found that
- 14 fitness program participants had half as many job grievances, half as many on-the-job
- 15 accidents, and 40% less lost time; now, therefore, be it
- 16 RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the
- 17 Governor of Maryland is urged to designate October 1996 as "Workplace Health and
- 18 Physical Fitness Wellness Month"; and be it further
- 19 RESOLVED, That the Governor is authorized and requested to issue a
- 20 proclamation calling on the people of the State of Maryland to observe the month with
- 21 appropriate ceremonies and activities; and be it further
- 22 RESOLVED, That the General Assembly requests all of its employees and support
- 23 agencies, all State units, and all employers, schools, recreation centers, health
- 24 professionals, and other interested organizations, groups, and individuals to participate in
- 25 and promote physical fitness and wellness activities during the month and at other times;
- 26 and be it further
- 27 RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be forwarded by the Department of
- 28 Legislative Reference to the Honorable Parris N. Glendening, Governor of Maryland; the
- 29 Honorable Thomas V. Mike Miller, Jr., President of the Senate of Maryland; and the
- 30 Honorable Casper R. Taylor, Jr., Speaker of the House of Delegates.
