BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF 12 13 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows: **Article - Courts and Judicial Proceedings** 14 15 5-106. (a) Except as provided by this section, a prosecution for a misdemeanor shall be 17 instituted within one year after the offense was committed. 18 (b) Notwithstanding Article 27, § 690(e) of the Code, if a statute provides that a 19 misdemeanor is punishable by imprisonment in the penitentiary, the State may institute a prosecution for the offense at any time. 21 (c) A prosecution under the vehicle code shall be instituted within two years after

- 2 (2) Fraudulently using a false or fictitious name when applying for a driver's
- 3 license.
- 4 (d) A prosecution for Sabbath breaking or drunkenness shall be instituted within
- 5 30 days after the offense was committed.
- 6 (e) In Allegany County, a prosecution for selling alcoholic beverages to a person
- 7 under the legal age for drinking such alcoholic beverages or for selling alcoholic
- 8 beverages after hours shall be instituted within 30 days after the offense was committed.
- 9 (f) A prosecution for the commission of or the attempt to commit a misdemeanor 10 constituting: (1) EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN SUBSECTION (H) OF THIS SECTION,a
- 11 criminal offense under the State election laws; or (2) a criminal offense under the State

- 34 shall be instituted within 1 year after the State Workers' CompensationCommission
- 35 finds, by order, that the employer was uninsured or, pursuant to the authority contained
- 36 in § 9-1003 of the Labor and Employment Article, within 1 year after the Uninsured
- 37 Employers' Fund makes payment under § 9-1003 of the Labor and Employment Article,

- 40 under § 7-265(b) of the Environment Article, shall be instituted within 2 years after

- 4 [(n)] (P) A prosecution for an offense under Article 27, § 388 or § 388A of the
- 5 Code shall be instituted within 3 years after the offense was committed.
- 6 [(o)] (Q) A prosecution for an offense of discrimination on the basis of sex in
- 7 paying wages under §§ 3-301 through 3-308 of the Labor and Employment Article shall
- 8 be instituted within 3 years after the performance of the act on which the prosecution is
- 9 based.
- 10 [(p)] (R) A prosecution for an offense of unlawfully charging or receiving
- 11 compensation in connection with an adoption under § 5-327 of the FamilyLaw Article
- 12 shall be instituted within 3 years after the offense was committed.
- [(q)] (S) A prosecution for an offense under § 14-601 of the Health Occupations
- 14 Article of practicing, attempting to practice, or offering to practice medicine without a
- 15 license shall be instituted within 3 years after the offense was committed.
- 16 [(r)] (T) A prosecution for an offense under the Maryland Charitable
- 17 Solicitations Act (Title 6 of the Business Regulations Article) shall be instituted within 3
- 18 years after the offense was committed.
- 19 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
- 20 October 1, 1996.
