16 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF

17 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

18 Article 27 - Crimes and Punishments

- 20 The following schedules include the controlled dangerous substances listed or to be 21 listed by whatever official name, common or usual name, chemical name, or trade name 22 designated.
- (a) Schedule I In determining that a substance comes within this schedule, theDepartment shall find:
- 25 (1) A high potential for abuse, and
- 26 (2) No accepted medical use in the United States, and
- (3) A lack of accepted safety for use under medical supervision. Thefollowing are controlled dangerous substances and are included in this schedule:

Unless specifically excepted or unless listed in another schedule, any material, compound, mixture or preparation which contains any quantity of the following substances having a depressant effect on the central nervous system, including its salts, isomers and salts of isomers when the existence of those salts, isomers and salts of isomers is possible within the specific chemical designation.

9 10	(d) Schedule IV - In determining that a substance comes within this schedule, theDepartment shall find that:		
11 12	1. The substance has a low potential for abuse relative to the substances listed in Schedule III; and		
13 14	2. The substance has currently accepted medical use in treatment in the United States; and		
15 16	3. Abuse of the substance may lead to limited physical dependence or psychological dependence relative to the substances in Schedule III.
