HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

1 A House Joint Resolution concerning

2 Restoration of Federal Support for Vulnerable Populations

- 3 FOR the purpose of urging the President and Congress of the United States to restore
- 4 federal funding for legal immigrants and certain children and adults declared
- 5 ineligible for temporary cash assistance, food stamps, medical assistance, and
- 6 supplemental security income under the Personal Responsibility and Work Act of
- 7 1996; and generally relating to requesting the restoration of certain federal support
- 8 and benefits to certain populations of individuals in the United States.
- 9 WHEREAS, 6,327 legal immigrants with permanent residence status in Maryland
- 10 will lose eligibility for federal Supplemental Security Income assistance beginning July 1,
- 11 1997; and
- 12 WHEREAS, 8,098 adult legal immigrants in Maryland will lose eligibility for food
- 13 stamps during fiscal year 1997; and
- WHEREAS, Approximately 8,300 legal immigrants entering Maryland after August
- 15 22, 1996, will be ineligible for medical assistance coverage; and
- WHEREAS, Notwithstanding Maryland's application for waiver from this
- 17 requirement, adults ages 18 to 50 years previously eligible for food stamps will receive
- 18 food stamps for only 3 months in 36 months unless working or engaged in a work activity,
- 19 costing Maryland \$240 million in federal funds over the next five years; and
- 20 WHEREAS, The federal welfare reform law alters the eligibility for children with
- 21 disabilities for the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program, removing an estimated
- 22 2,400 Maryland children from income support beginning July 1, 1997; and
- 23 WHEREAS, Approximately 15 percent of disabled children in Maryland who lose
- 24 SSI eligibility will also lose necessary medical coverage; and
- WHEREAS, The SSI Childhood program enables disabled children to remain in
- 26 their homes and communities without the need for institutionalization; and
- 27 WHEREAS, The Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Act of 1996
- 28 counts education as a work activity for only 20 percent of a state's welfare population,
- 29 including teenagers; and

- WHEREAS, Statistics demonstrate that welfare recipients with a GED or high school diploma have better opportunities to obtain long-term employment than recipients without a secondary education; now, therefore, be it
- 4 RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the 5 President of the United States and Congress of the United States are respectfully urged:
- 6 (1) To fully restore federal support for food stamps, medical assistance, 7 temporary cash assistance, and supplemental security income for all legal immigrants in 8 the United States;
- 9 (2) To fully restore federal food stamp support for eligible adults between 10 the ages of 18 and 50;
- 11 (3) Fully restore eligibility to disabled children removed for Supplemental
- 12 Security Income (SSI) children's program under the Personal Responsibility and Work
- 13 Opportunity Act of 1996; and
- 14 (4) To expand the percentage of welfare recipients who may undertake
- 15 educational activities and extend the time limit beyond 1 year for education under the
- 16 Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Act of 1996; and be it further
- 17 RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be forwarded by the Department of

- 19 branches of the United States Congress; the Maryland Congressional Delegation:
