WHEREAS, The individual needs of a person in need of long-term care differ

depending on the nature of the person's disability; and

RESOLUTION NO.\_\_\_\_\_ 1 A House Joint Resolution concerning 2 Flexibility in the Provision of Long-Term Care 3 FOR the purpose of expressing the intent of the General Assembly of Maryland regarding the provision of long-term care in the State; and directing the Health 4 Care Financing Administration to be less restrictive in imposing conditions on the 5 6 receipt of federal funds for the provision of long-term care in the State and to allow the State greater flexibility in deciding how to best utilize the funds available for the 7 8 provision of long-term care. 9 WHEREAS, Long-term care is utilized by persons over 65 years old, persons with functional disabilities under 65 years old, persons with developmental disabilities, and 10 persons with mental illness in this State; and 12 WHEREAS, Demographic trends indicate that expenditures for long-term care will 13 continue to grow and populations in need of long term care will continue to require 14 long-term care; and

- 1 WHEREAS, The purpose of long-term care is to provide assistance in allowing the
- 2 individual to function at maximum ability, which may include habilitative services,
- 3 rehabilitation, and maintenance of function at optimum levels possible as health status
- 4 changes; and
- 5 WHEREAS, Long term care recipients often are best served in home and
- 6 -community-based settings instead of institutional settings; and
- WHEREAS, While institutional long-term care may be appropriate under some
- 8 circumstances, long-term care recipients often are best served in home-, community-, and
- 9 assisted living-based settings; and
- 10 WHEREAS, Persons in need of long-term care desire accessible home and
- 11 -community-based home-, community-, and assisted living-based services to assist them in
- 12 preserving their independence and preventing institutionalization; and
- 13 WHEREAS, Those services should include financial assistance for capital
- 14 improvements to the homes of persons in need of long-term care, if the improvements
- 15 would enable them to remain in the community; and
- WHEREAS, Persons in need of long-term care have an overwhelming interest in
- 17 the amount of choice and control they will have in their personal care services and should
- 18 be accommodated in their desire for "independent living"; and
- WHEREAS, Persons in need of long-term care should be able to choose accessible
- 20 and affordable home- or community-based home-, community-, or assisted living-based
- 21 long-term care as an option to institutional long-term care; and
- WHEREAS, Maryland wants the ability to create a higher standard of financial
- 23 eligibility for community-based long-term care under the Medical Assistance Program,
- 24 thereby helping people remain in the community and avoiding the high costs of
- 25 institutionalized care; and
- WHEREAS, Maryland has a rich array of programs and services available to meet
- 27 the needs of those persons who require long-term care in the State; now, therefore, be it
- 28 RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the
- 29 United States Health Care Financing Administration should be less restrictive in the
- 30 conditions it sets on the receipt of federal funds by the State and should allow the State
- 31 greater flexibility in deciding how to best utilize the federal funds it receives for the
- 32 provision of long-term care; and be it further
