2 Flexibility in the Provision of Long-Term Care

- 3 FOR the purpose of expressing the intent of the General Assembly of Maryland
- 4 regarding the provision of long-term care in the State; and directing the Health
- 5 Care Financing Administration to be less restrictive in imposing conditions on the
- 6 receipt of federal funds for the provision of long-term care in the State and to allow
- 7 the State greater flexibility in deciding how to best utilize the funds available for the
- 8 provision of long-term care.
- 9 WHEREAS, Long-term care is utilized by persons over 65 years old, persons with
- 10 functional disabilities under 65 years old, persons with developmental disabilities, and
- 11 persons with mental illness in this State; and
- WHEREAS, Demographic trends indicate that expenditures for long-term care will
- 13 continue to grow and populations in need of long term care will continue to require
- 14 long-term care; and
- 15 WHEREAS, The individual needs of a person in need of long-term care differ
- 16 depending on the nature of the person's disability; and
- 17 WHEREAS, The purpose of long-term care is to provide assistance in allowing the
- 18 individual to function at maximum ability, which may include habilitative services,
- 19 rehabilitation, and maintenance of function at optimum levels possible as health status
- 20 changes; and
- 21 WHEREAS, Long-term care recipients often are best served in home- and
- 22 community-based settings instead of institutional settings; and
- 23 WHEREAS, Persons in need of long-term care desire accessible home- and
- 24 community-based services to assist them in preserving their independence and preventing
- 25 institutionalization; and
- WHEREAS, Those services should include financial assistance for capital
- 27 improvements to the homes of persons in need of long-term care, if the improvements
- 28 would enable them to remain in the community; and

- 1 WHEREAS, Persons in need of long-term care have an overwhelming interest in
- 2 the amount of choice and control they will have in their personal care services and should
- 3 be accommodated in their desire for "independent living"; and
- 4 WHEREAS, Persons in need of long-term care should be able to choose accessible
- 5 and affordable home- or community-based long-term care as an option to institutional
- 6 long-term care; and
- WHEREAS, Maryland wants the ability to create a higher standard of financial
- 8 eligibility for community-based long-term care under the Medical Assistance Program,
- 9 thereby helping people remain in the community and avoiding the high costs of
- 10 institutionalized care; and
- WHEREAS, Maryland has a rich array of programs and services available to meet
- 12 the needs of those persons who require long-term care in the State; now, therefore, be it
- 13 RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the
- 14 United States Health Care Financing Administration should be less restrictive in the
- 15 conditions it sets on the receipt of federal funds by the State and should allow the State
- 16 greater flexibility in deciding how to best utilize the federal funds it receives for the
- 17 provision of long-term care; and be it further
