## 2 Baltimore City - Community Benefits Districts - Continuation of Authority

- 3 FOR the purpose of extending the termination date on certain provisions of law that
- 4 relate to the authority to establish community benefits districts in Baltimore City
- 5 and the administration of community benefits districts.
- 6 BY repealing and reenacting, without amendments,

- 14 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
- 15 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

## 16 The Charter of Baltimore City

- 17 Article II General Powers
- The Mayor and City Council of Baltimore shall have full power and authority to
- 19 exercise all of the powers heretofore or hereafter granted to it by the Constitution of
- 20 Maryland or by any Public General or Public Local Laws of the State of Maryland; and in
- 21 particular, without limitation upon the foregoing, shall have power by ordinance, or such
- 22 other method as may be provided for in its Charter, subject to the provisions of said
- 23 Constitution and Public General Laws:
- 24 (63) (a) (1) To establish, by ordinance, not more than six community benefits
- 25 district management authorities, including the Charles Village Community Benefits
- 26 District, within the City to provide services consistent with paragraph (2) of this
- 27 subsection to the business interests and residents of the proposed district.
- 28 (2) To establish community benefits district management authorities to
- 29 promote and market districts, provide supplemental security and maintenance services,

- 29 (ix) running west along the center line of 33rd Street to the center line 30 of Charles Street; then
- 31 (x) running south along the center line of Charles Street to the center 32 line of 29th Street; then
- 33 (xi) running west along the center line of 29th Street to the center line 34 of Howard Street; then running south along the center line of Howard Street to the
- 35 center line of 26th Street; then
- (xii) running west along the center line of 26th Street to the center line 36 37 of Huntingdon Avenue; then running south along the center line of Huntingdon Avenue
- 38 to the center line of 25th Street; then

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1 2	(xiii) running east along the center line of 25th Street to the center line of Howard Street;		
3 4	(xiv) running south along the center line of Howard Street to the center line of 24th Street; then

	(xvi) running south along the center line of Huntingdon Avenue the center line of 23rd Street; then running west along the center line of 23rd Street to the center line of Huntingdon Avenue; then		
10 11	(xvii) running south along the center line of Huntingdon Avenue the center line of 21st Street; then		
12 13	(xviii) running east along the center line of 21st Street to the center line of Howard Street; then		
14 15	(xix) running south along the center line of Howard Street to the center line of 20th Street (point of origin).		
18	(2) Notwithstanding paragraph (1) of this subsection, the Charles Village Community Benefits District may include properties binding on either side of a street or the CSX railroad tracks where they comprise part of the boundaries under this subsection.		
20 21	(c) An ordinance establishing a community benefits district management authority shall address the following:		
	(1) specify the powers and functions within the limits of this section, which may be exercised and conducted by the Authority and the amount of taxes or charges which may be imposed on properties in the district.		
25 26	(2) specify the duration of the Authority and define the boundaries of the district.		
29 30	(3) provide for the imposition and collection of the taxes or charges and for disbursement of the revenue therefrom to the Authority. The financial plan of the Authority, including its annual budget and its tax rate and schedule of charges, shall be subject to approval by the Board of Estimates. Taxes and charges imposed under this paragraph may not exceed those proposed by the Authority.		
34 35	(4) determine the organization and method of initial appointment of officers and board members of the Authority. The majority of the members of the board shall be owners or representatives of owners of properties in the district that are subject to taxes or charges under this section. A voting member of the board must be eligible to vote in the election under subsection (j) of this section.		
	(5) determine what classes of property in the district owned by public service companies as defined in Article 78 of the Annotated Code of Maryland shall be subject to or exempt from taxes or charges under this section.		

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1	(d) As provided by ordinance, the Authority may have the power:
2	(1) to be a special tax district and to conduct the functions which are assigned to it by the City;
4	(2) to acquire, hold and use property necessary to achieve its purposes;
5	(3) to make contracts;
6	(4) to sue and be sued;
7 8	(5) to borrow and accept grants for purposes consistent with the purposes of the Authority;
9	(6) to employ and discharge personnel to carry out its public purposes;
12 13 14 15	(7) to propose in its annual budget the taxes or charges on property within the district. Property that is exempt under State law from ordinary property taxes shall be exempt from taxes or charges assessed to support the Authority. Before adopting its proposed budget and making its recommendations to the City, an Authority shall hold a public hearing on taxes or charges proposed for the district. The Authority shall publish notice of the hearing in a newspaper of general circulation in Baltimore City at least once a week for 3 consecutive weeks before the hearing;
17 18	(8) to adopt, amend and modify bylaws, all of which shall be subject to the approval of the Board of Estimates;
19	(9) to establish and elect officers and provide for their terms and duties;
22 23	(10) to contract for and purchase goods and services, without being subject to the City requirements regarding wage scales, competitive bidding or other local procurement laws. However, the Authority shall be subject to City ordinances and City policy requiring achievement of goals regarding minority and women's business enterprises; and
25	(11) to do all things necessary or convenient to carry out its powers.
26	(e) An Authority created under this section may not:
27 28	(1) exercise any police or general powers other than those authorized by State law and City ordinance;
29	(2) pledge the full faith or credit of the City;
30 31	(3) impose taxes or charges in excess of those approved by the Board of Estimates;
32	(4) exercise the power of eminent domain;
33	(5) extend its life without the approval of the City Council;
34 35	(6) except as otherwise provided by law, engage in competition with the private sector;

1 2	(7) except as otherwise provided in subsection (i) of this section, revert charges or taxes collected pursuant to this section to the General Fund of the City;
	(8) be an agency of the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore or the State of Maryland and its officers and employees may not act as agents or employees of the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore or the State of Maryland;
6	(9) employ individuals who reside outside the City of Baltimore; and
7 8	(10) except as required or appropriate to facilitate its normal operations, incur debt.
9	(f) In adopting an ordinance, the City Council shall:
	(1) give consideration to the views of the property owners, the retail merchants, the property tenants, and the other members of the business and residential communities within the district;
13 14	(2) make a determination that a district created under this section will reflect a diverse mix of business and residential properties; and
15 16	(3) make a determination that a district created under this section will reflect a diverse economic, social, and racial mix.
	(g) The Mayor and City Council shall review the effectiveness and desirability of continuing the existence of any district established under this section every 4 years from the enactment of the ordinance.
	(h) The Mayor and City Council of Baltimore may not permit a reduction in the services provided by the City in a district due to the establishment of a community benefits district management authority.
23 24	(i) In the event of a dissolution of a community benefits district, any unspent funds shall revert back to the City's General Fund.
25 26	(j) (1) An ordinance adopted pursuant to this section shall take effect only if approved by 58% of the aggregate votes cast in a special election by the affected voters.
27 28	(2) The ordinance shall provide criteria for the eligibility of voters for purposes of the election required by this subsection.
29 30	(3) The ordinance shall provide procedures for a special election as required in this subsection, which may be administered by write-in ballots.

34	SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect June 1, 1994. It shall remain effective for a period of [3] 7 years and, at the end of May 31, [1997] 2001, with no further action required by the General Assembly, this Act shall be abrogated and of no further force and effect.

36 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 37 June 1, 1997.
