- 9 WHEREAS, Eighteen states have designated a state gem; and
- 10 WHEREAS, The color yellow or Maryland gold is prominent in the State flag and
- 11 Great Seal and traces back to the Calvert Family Arms certified in 1617 and first
- 12 exhibited in 1622; and
- WHEREAS, The black-eyed susan was chosen as the State flower because it
- 14 reflects the color of the Lords Baltimore in the State flag; and
- WHEREAS, Gems and precious metals always have been of great interest to the
- 16 citizens of Maryland and today the Maryland Institute of Art and Towson State
- 17 University are recognized for their instruction in jewelry design and fabrication; and
- 18 WHEREAS, Golden topaz is formed from the orthorhombic crystal system in well
- 19 formed crystals and is yellow to yellowish orange in color; and
- WHEREAS, The official designation of golden topaz as the State gem would be
- 21 consistent with the long history and heraldic nature of Maryland's colors and provide a
- 22 symbol that brings great enjoyment and excitement to its citizens; now, therefore,

- 1 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
- 2 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:
- 3 **Article State Government**
- 4 13-315.
- 5 GOLDEN TOPAZ IS THE STATE GEM.
- 6 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 7 October 1, 1997.
