4 FOR the purpose of requiring the State to provide funding to University of Maryland

12 WHEREAS, Higher education, and the institutions that provide it, are increasingly 13 prominent factors in the quality of life and economic development of states and nations;

14 and

WHEREAS, The international economy, labor market demands for a highly skilled
and professional work force, and rapid technological change increasingly require
education beyond high school for both individuals and economies; and

WHEREAS, It is essential if Maryland is to maintain and improve its competitiveposition in the region and the world, that Maryland's work force continue to be upgraded;and

1 WHEREAS, There are increasing numbers of nontraditional and part-time 2 students in Maryland who require accessible and moderate cost higher education in order 3 to meet the work force demands of a changing economy; and

WHEREAS, University College, one of the constituent institutions in the University
of Maryland System, serves a unique role by providing a variety of educational programs,
including scientific, technical, and management programs, to enhance students' career
development while providing Maryland employers a more skilled and productive work
force; and

9 WHEREAS, There are 14,000 students attending University College programs in 10 Maryland who pay the highest undergraduate tuition among the State's public institutions 11 and two to three times the tuition charged by Maryland community colleges; and

12 WHEREAS, Because of the State's severe economic downturn in 1992, the State 13 eliminated its funding commitment to help offset the relatively high cost of tuition at 14 University College; and

15 WHEREAS, The State's economy has improved significantly since State assistance 16 to University College was eliminated; now, therefore,

17 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF18 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

BEGINNING IN FISCAL YEAR 1999, THE STATE SHALL PROVIDE FUNDING FOR
 UNIVERSITY OF MARYLAND UNIVERSITY COLLEGE IN THE FOLLOWING AMOUNTS:

 YEAR PRECEDING THE FISCAL YEAR FOR WHICH THE AID APPROPRIATION IS MADE

HIGHER EDUCATION IN THIS STATE FOR THE PRECEDING FISCAL YEAR;

(2) FOR THE FISCAL YEAR THAT BEGINS JULY 1, 2000 1999, AN AMOUNT
EQUAL TO 12 PERCENT OF THE STATE'S GENERAL FUND PER FULL-TIME
EQUIVALENT STUDENT APPROPRIATION TO THE 4-YEAR PUBLIC INSTITUTIONS OF
HIGHER EDUCATION IN THIS STATE FOR THE PRECEDING FISCAL YEAR;

37 EQUAL TO 14 PERCENT OF THE STATE'S GENERAL FUND PER FULL-TIME

6 HIGHER EDUCATION IN THIS STATE FOR THE PRECEDING FISCAL YEAR; AND

7 (6) FOR THE FISCAL YEAR THAT BEGINS JULY 1, 2004 2003, AND FOR
8 <u>SUBSEQUENT FISCAL YEARS</u>, AN AMOUNT EQUAL TO 20 PERCENT OF THE STATE'S
9 GENERAL FUND PER FULL-TIME EQUIVALENT STUDENT APPROPRIATION TO THE
10 4-YEAR PUBLIC INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION IN THIS STATE FOR THE
11 PRECEDING FISCAL YEAR.

12 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 13 October 1, 1997.
