House Bill 1360 (Delegate Ciliberti, *et al.*) Commerce and Government Matters

Vehicle Laws - Violation of Speed Restrictions - Fines Doubled

This bill doubles the fines currently established by the Chief Judge of the District Court of Maryland for the violations of specified speed restrictions under the Maryland Vehicle Law.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: Potential significant increase in general fund revenues and expenditures as discussed below.

Local Effect: None.

Small Business Effect: None. The bill would not directly affect small businesses.

Fiscal Analysis

State Effect: Under the Maryland Vehicle Law, the maximum penalty for each of these offenses is \$500. The Chief Judge of the District Court of Maryland establishes fines for defendants who choose to prepay for the offense rather than appear in court to contest the violation. The bill doubles these fines for certain driving offenses. **Exhibit 1** lists each offense, the number of violations in fiscal 1996, the current fine, and the fine under the bill. Doubling the fine for exceeding the maximum speed limit by 40 miles or more results in a fine of \$1,000 which is over the statutory limit of \$500.

In fiscal 1996 there was a total of 417,516 violations of these offenses. The number of resulting convictions is unknown. The District Court estimates that \$19 million in fine revenues was generated from these violations in fiscal 1996. Thus, doubling the fines conceivably could result in an additional \$19 million in revenues, based on fiscal 1996 experience. However, increasing the motor vehicle fines will result in an increase in the number of individuals who fail to pay their fines or elect to appear in court to contest the violation. Accordingly, it is unlikely that doubling the assessed fines would result in a doubling of the revenues collected. Further, depending upon the magnitude of the increase in

the number of individuals who appear before the court, expenditures could increase for additional judges, courtroom staff, and facilities to handle the increased workload.
