Disclosure of Medical Records - Mental Health Services

This amended bill authorizes health care providers to maintain “personal notes” regarding recipients of mental health services. A medical record does not include personal notes under certain circumstances. A health care provider is prohibited from disclosing a portion of a medical record relating to a psychological test to any person, including the subject of the test, if disclosure would compromise the objectivity or fairness of the test. A health care provider may disclose a medical record relating to a psychological test (1) if the subject of the test designates a certain health care provider to whom the medical record may be disclosed; or (2) for educational or research purposes. The bill does not prohibit the disclosure of a personal note to a recipient for the purpose of malpractice or negligence claims and does not restrict access to a medical record which is also an education record under federal law.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: None. The bill would not substantively change State activities or operations.

Local Effect: None.

Small Business Effect: Although small business health care providers of mental health services would be affected by the bill, there would be no discernible economic impact.
