13 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF

14 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

Article - Education

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17 (a) (1) The State Board shall require a minimum level of reading ability for 18 each grade 2 through 12 that rises for each succeeding grade.

19(2)THE STANDARD FOR THE MINIMUM READING LEVEL SHALL BE THAT20OF A NATIONAL STANDARDIZED ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT TEST.

10(2)Recommendations for legislation that the State Board and the State11Superintendent consider necessary to improve the quality of education in this State.
