# A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

#### 2

## **Educational Opportunities Program of 1998**

3 FOR the purpose of reducing the public capital and operational costs of elementary

and secondary education and improving the quality of the education by 4

5 financially assisting parents and guardians of school children to select the

6 public or nonpublic schools that they believe are in the best interest of the

children in their care; defining certain terms; establishing a program for the 7

8 issuance of grants to eligible parents and guardians; establishing a commission

9 to administer the program; establishing rules for the program; providing for

continuous replenishment of the funds for grants issued under the program; 10

providing for a maximum amount for each grant; providing for the effective date 11

of this Act; and generally relating to facilitating the most efficient use of public 12

and nonpublic educational institutions to fulfill the educational obligation of 13

both the State and the counties at significantly lower operational and capital 14

15 costs.

# Preamble

28 WHEREAS, An educated citizenry is essential to the general welfare of the

29 State and the effective functioning of the State government; and

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1 WHEREAS, The combination of an increased school population, higher public

2 education costs, more demand for local services, and greatly reduced State and

3 Federal revenue portend a financial crisis for local governments in Maryland; and

4 WHEREAS, Encouraging wider use under this program of available public 5 schools across school district lines on a space available basis is efficient and 6 cost-effective; and

WHEREAS, Encouraging wider use of nonpublic schools under this program is
cost-effective because the maximum grant under the program is half the average per
pupil cost in the State; and

10 WHEREAS, Increasing access to nonpublic schools will alleviate the financial 11 burdens on the State by decreasing the need for expanded public school facilities and 12 therefore the amount of money needed for debt service; and

WHEREAS, The existence of this program can be expected reasonably to result
in expansion of the number of available nonpublic school facilities, at no cost to the
State or county governments; and

16 WHEREAS, The needs of individual students vary widely and are often best met 17 by public or nonpublic schools of their parents' or guardians' choosing; and

WHEREAS, Low and middle-income parents or guardians, due to a lack of
sufficient financial resources, have a limited choice, if any, in selecting schools their
children attend; and

21 WHEREAS, Increasing access to a variety of public and nonpublic schools and 22 the act of choosing a school will help generate greater family commitment to 23 education and the school of choice, thereby improving the educational programs; and

WHEREAS, Increasing access to a variety of public and nonpublic schools will
produce socioeconomic integration and encourage the development of new schools and
innovative curricula that meet the varying needs of students; and

WHEREAS, Helping parents and guardians send their children to the public or nonpublic school of their choice will benefit the public schools of this State through the discipline of competition for students; and

30 WHEREAS, The provisions of this Act are intended to serve a secular public 31 purpose; now, therefore,

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SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That, subject to the budgetary
 process, this Act shall apply to tuition costs incurred during the 1998-99 school year,
 and shall be reflected in the Fiscal Year 2000 budget, effective July 1, 1999.

SECTION 4. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 4 5 July 1, 1998.
