CHAPTER 1 AN ACT concerning 2 **Higher Education - Community Colleges - Innovative Partnerships for** 3 **Technology Program** FOR the purpose of establishing an Innovative Partnerships for Technology Program 4 for State community colleges; defining certain terms; setting forth how a certain 5 match will be determined and how certain payments will be made; requiring 6 7 that the payments made to certain institutions not exceed a certain amount; 8 establishing certain eligibility criteria; providing for the application of certain 9 funds; prohibiting certain funds from being included in the computation of a

1 generally relating to an Innovative Partnerships for Technology Program for State community colleges. 2 3 BY adding to Article - Education 4 5 Section 16-317 Annotated Code of Maryland 6 7 (1997 Replacement Volume and 1997 Supplement) 8 Preamble 9 WHEREAS, Public-private partnerships are becoming increasingly important 10 to the success of Maryland's community colleges; and 11 WHEREAS, A good example of such a partnership is the Advanced Technology 12 Center Initiative, which has led to regional cooperative training efforts in the area of 13 technology amongst community colleges, local businesses, and county governments; 14 and 15 WHEREAS, While public-private partnerships have grown dramatically over 16 the last decade, community colleges continue to face fiscal constraints in providing the most up-to-date technology required by today's businesses and students; and 18 WHEREAS, The creation of an Innovative Partnerships for Technology Program 19 would provide a means of acquiring technology through a public-private effort, 20 whereby State funds can be used to leverage private and local support for community 21 colleges; now, therefore, SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF 22 23 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows: 24 **Article - Education** 25 16-317. IN THIS SECTION THE FOLLOWING WORDS HAVE THE MEANINGS 26 (A) (1) 27 INDICATED. 28 (2) "BASE YEAR" MEANS JULY 1, 1997 THROUGH JUNE 30, 1998. 29 "CONTRIBUTION" MEANS MONETARY AND EQUIPMENT DONATIONS (3) 30 THAT HAVE BEEN ASSESSED A MONETARY VALUE AMOUNT FOR THE PURPOSES OF 31 DETERMINING THE STATE PAYMENT. 32 (4) (I) "ELIGIBLE DONOR" MEANS ANY INDIVIDUAL, CORPORATION, 33 PARTNERSHIP, OR OTHER FORM OF BUSINESS ORGANIZATION, PUBLIC OR PRIVATE

- 1 (D) CONTRIBUTIONS MADE BY THE STATE UNDER THIS SECTION MAY NOT 2 EXCEED \$500,000 \$200,000 DURING EACH ELIGIBLE PERIOD TO EACH ELIGIBLE 3 INSTITUTION.
- 4 (E) (1) TO DETERMINE ELIGIBILITY FOR STATE PAYMENTS, EACH
 5 CONTRIBUTION SHALL BE COMPARED TO THE AMOUNT CONTRIBUTED DURING THE
 6 BASE YEAR. THE FOLLOWING CRITERIA SHALL BE THE BASIS FOR COMPARISON:
- 7 (I) EACH CONTRIBUTION MUST BE FROM A NEW DONOR; OR
- 8 (II) EACH CONTRIBUTION MUST REPRESENT AN INCREASE OVER 9 THE AMOUNT CONTRIBUTED BY THE DONOR DURING THE BASE YEAR.
- 10 (2) A CONTRIBUTION RECEIVED DURING THE BASE YEAR THAT FULFILS
 11 <u>FULFILLS</u> A PLEDGE MADE PRIOR TO THE BASE YEAR MAY NOT BE INCLUDED IN THE
 12 DETERMINATION OF THE CONTRIBUTION MADE DURING THE BASE YEAR.
- 13 (3) EACH CONTRIBUTION MUST BE SPECIFICALLY DESIGNATED FOR 14 TECHNOLOGY.
- 15 (F) CONTRIBUTIONS MADE BY THE STATE UNDER THIS SECTION MAY BE 16 APPLIED TO ANY ELIGIBLE TECHNOLOGY EXPENSE AT AN ELIGIBLE INSTITUTION TO 17 WHICH THE PAYMENT IS MADE.
- 18 (G) CONTRIBUTIONS MADE BY THE STATE TO ANY ELIGIBLE INSTITUTION 19 UNDER THIS SECTION MAY NOT DIRECTLY OR INDIRECTLY REDUCE THE STATE 20 GENERAL FUND OR CAPITAL FUND SUPPORT FOR THE ELIGIBLE INSTITUTION.
- 21 (H) THE MARYLAND HIGHER EDUCATION COMMISSION SHALL:
- 22 (1) ADOPT REGULATIONS NECESSARY FOR THE ADMINISTRATION OF 23 THIS SECTION; AND
- 24 (2) SUBMIT TO THE GOVERNOR AND, IN ACCORDANCE WITH § 2-1246 OF
- 25 THE STATE GOVERNMENT ARTICLE, TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY AN ANNUAL
- 26 REPORT SUMMARIZING THE TOTAL AMOUNT OF FUNDS PLEDGED BY ELIGIBLE
- 27 DONORS AND TOTAL AMOUNT OF FUNDS RAISED.
